Ottawa, June 10.—The annual report of the Minister of Justice, laid on the table of Ottawa, June 10.—The annual report of the Minister of Justice, laid on the table of the House to-day, gives the penitentiary population as 1,361, compared with 1,277, an increase of six and a half per cent. Only one successful escape occurred. The number pardoned was fifty-two, compared with seventy-three the year before. There were eight deaths; five at Kingston, two at Dorchester, and one at St. Vincent de Paul. At Dorchester twenty per cent. of the population are under twenty years of age, and 126 altogether. There were 533 of the convicts intemperate, 706 temperate, and 122 total abstainers. In nationalities they stood: 937 Canadians, 136 Americans, 132 English, fifty-eight Irish, thirty-four Scotch, fourteen Chinese, nine Germans, eight French and five Italians. There are 880 single, 472 married and nine widowed. Fifty-five are in for life. There are forty-seven per cent. Roman Catholics, twenty-one per cent. Church of England, fourteen per cent. Methodists, eight per cent. Presbyterians and five per cent. Baptists. Of those who can read and write there are 1,046; who cannot read, 235, and who cannot write, 80. About twenty per cent. are in for offences against the person, seventy per cent. against property, and ten per cent against the public generally. About
