4. The postage must be pre-paid by stamp. A book packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanaes, maps or prints, photographs, daguerreotypes, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters); and the books, maps, paper, &c., may be either written, printed, or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial

or Foreign. All legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet, whether such binding,&c., be loose or attached, as also rollers, in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or whatever generally appertains thereto, and the postage is rated upon the gross weight of the packet.
