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One of the steam shovels engaged in work on the Panama Canal, in the operation of which more than 300 employees were engaged recently lifted out a quantity of dynamite which is described in an official report as being "more than a bushel." What would have happened if the shovel had struck the dynamite instead of the earth around it is easy to imagine. The explosive was in sticks three-quarters of an inch in diameter and five inches long and the cartridges bore the trademark of a French manufacturer of dynamite and a date which appeared to be November 29, 1887. Unquestionably the dynamite was put in by the French and either failed to explode or was abandoned when the work ceased. The dynamite appeared to be in perfect condition.
