The Assembly then again went into Committee on the Union question, Rov. Dr. Thornton in the chair.

Rev. J. McTavish moved that inasmuch as a number of the members of the Assembly selt dissatisfied with the third and fourth resolutions accompanying the proposed basis of Union, this Committee agreed to atk the General Assembly to ask the Synod in connection with the Church of Scotland to confer with the Assembly in reference to those resolutions, in the hope that some satisfactory decision may be arrived at. He stated that he could not agree to the Act of Independence referred to in the third

Roy. Mr. Ure said he supposed Mr. Mc-Tavish objected to the Act of Independence because of the circumstances under which it was obtained, and not because of what it contained.

Rov. Dr. McVicar said Mr. Ure was diseussing a question which had been decided.

Rev. Mr. Uro asked Mr. McTavish if he simply objected to one of the grounds on which the resolution was based.

Rev. Mr. McTavish replied in the affirm

Rev. Mr. Ure said in that case he saw no reason for asking for a conference upon it.

Rev. Dr. Burns said he would be willing to submit the third resolution to a conference, but was not so clear about the fourth. Rev. Mr. McTavish agreed to separate

the two resolutions.

Roy. Dr. Burns then supported the motion.

Rev. J. M. King disagreed with the course taken by Mr. McTavish. It was undesira-ble to multiply these references to the Conference, if they desired to have unanimity.

Rev. Professor McLaren moved-"That this Committee is of opinion that no judgment should be given by the Assembly on the 3rd resolution." He said it was clear that the decuments named in this resolution had not satisfied the Assembly. As to the necessary unanimity on the question of the headship of Christ, they had now adopted a premble which rendered them utterly unaccession. necessary.

Rev. J. McTavish withdrew his motion in favour of Professor McLaren's motion. (Hear, hear.)

Rev. Principal Caven said the Union Committee had not looked on the Act of Independence as a statement of the doctrine of the headship of Christ. That doctrine was stated in the formula used by the Synod:—" In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the King and only head of this Church." The Act of Independence showed the application of the doctrine to the point of the independence of the Church. The Assembly was not asked to endorse the Act as an historical document, but he was con-vinced that the sister Church would be quite willing to allow this resolution to drop.

At the suggestion of Principal Caven, Professor McLaren altered his resolution so as to read as follows :- "That the deliverance come to on the preamble renders it unnecessary in the opinion of this Committee that any judgment should be given by Azsembly on the third resolution." Agreed

Rev. J. M. King presented a commission appointing the Rey. J. Vannest a delegate from the Synod of the Reformed Church of America. He pointed out the similarity of the Church in question to their own.

Rev. Mr. Vannest was called by the Moderator, and addressed the Assembly. He extended the cordial greetings of his Church to this Assembly, He referred to the Referenced (formerly the Dutch) Church, and to the remarkable way in which it had been brought into connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church. He gave an account of the working of his own Church, stated that Christian Union was everywhere being discussed in the United States, re-ferred to the progress of the same sentiment olsowhere, and suggested that something might arise out of the Reciprocity Treaty so that they would come to be fellow-citizens. (Loud cries of No.) He concluded by bidding them "God Speed."

The Moderator tendered to Mr Vannes the thanks of the Assembly for his visit and address, and observed that though as a Church they had not much to do with material reciprocity, they were happy to know that his Church and this had for some years carried on reciprocity; and though this Assembly would not favour annexation to the neighbouring country—(cheers)—they would not so much object to annexation of their Churches to one another.

Saturday, June 6.

The Assembly met at 10 o'clock. After devotional exercises and the confirmation of the minutes,

Rev. Dr. Topo stated that he had communicated the resolutions passed y sterday to the Synod in connection with the Church of Scotland, and they had consented to a conference with the Assembly at 11 o'clock to day.

It was resolved to adjourn at 11 o'clock. The Assembly again went into Committee on the Union question.

The following resolution as agreed to The Committee expresses general approval of the resolutions, with the exception of those which have already been dealt with.

The following ministers recorded their dissent from the resolution: - Messrs. J. Middlemss, J. McTavish, J. Ross, J. Scott, J. Ferguson, and Cameron.

The Committee then rose and reported the resolution to the Assembly, by whom it was received and adopted.

The Assembly then adjourned. AFTERNOON BEDERUNT.

The Assembly met at three o'clock. Rev.W. Reid read the report referring to Knox College. The Board of Management reported that in October, 1873, Rev. W. McLaren had been inducted into the office of Professor of Systematic Theology, and that Rev. Dr. Proudfoot, during the first half of the session, had conducted classes in homiletics, pastoral theology, and Church covernment. Instructions in elecution government. Instructions in elecution were also given by Mr. Taverner. There were 38 students in the theological department, 18 of the first year, nine of the secment, 18 of the first year, nine of the second, and sixteen of the third year. There were also nuneteen in the preparatory department. The contributions to the ordinary fund had amounted to \$7,700, leaving a deficit of \$1,802. The endowment fund now amounted to \$6,612. The contributions to the bursary fund had amounted to \$1,988, which, with a balance from last year, amounted to \$2,074, which had all been expended except \$58. The amount subscribed for the new College building was \$86,159, of which \$22,871 had been already paid. The contracts let amounted to \$73,-580, not including several items. It had been found necessary, to meet engagements with contractors, to borrow \$10,000 from the Western Assurance Company on a mortgage on the old building and site. It was expected that the new building would be completed early next year. The Board especially thanked Principal Cavan and Professors Gregg and McLaron for their exertions in canvassing for subscriptions, and also a sub-Committee, of which Hon. J. McMurrich was the Convener for the year. The Governor-General had offered to prosent a silver medal for competition by the theological students, which had been accepted. An increase in the salarios of the Professors was recommended. The financal report and the reports of the Senate and Board of Examiners were also read, but the report of the Board of Management contained a summary of these reports.

Rev. W. Reid then read the report of the Board of Management of the Montreal College. They reported the completion of the new college, of which they gave a description. The receipts on account of the building fund had been \$43,522, of which \$35,804 had been paid. The amount expended for the purchase of the ground and building had been \$12,128, which was \$9,324 in excess of the receipts. Considerable 324 in excess of the receipts. Considerable expenditure was yet required to pay outstanding accounts, enlarge the building, etc. The expenditure for the year had been Rev. G. Ross moved in amendment that the Committee rise, report progress, and ask leave to sit again.

Hon. John McMurrich thought this had gone far enough, and the time was come to limit it. They were showing no consideration for the Union Committee, but all the consideration for the other members. Rev. Professor Bryco read the report of the Board of Management of Manitoba College. The receipts up to the first meeting of the Board had been \$1,021, and the expenditure \$1.021. The total receipts of \$3,000 was required. The total receipts of the College for the year had been \$2,815. There were 32 students in the College.

Rev. W. Reid read the report of the Com mission appointed last year to visit Manitoba and enquire into educational matters. The following were the principal paragraphs of the report, which was signed by the Rev. R. Ure and W. As to whether the interests of the College and the purposes for which it has been established would be promoted by having classes taught in con-nection with it both in Kildomi and in Winnipeg, compromise of this soit had been proposed by some parties, but it was not tery expressed itself opposed to the scheme by a majority of 5 to 4, holding that it would be against the interests of the College to have recourse to it under any cur-cumstances. Those who at all favored the plan did so not as believing it to be a good one, but from a desire to conciliate Kildona-interests. All interested in Kildonan, how ever, were at one with the majority of the Presbytery in rejecting the compromise, declaring that rather than agree to such a change they would prefer to have the insti-tution removed from Cildonan altogether. As to whether, in the event of the compronaise above mentioned being set aside, the interest and usefulness of the College would prompted by its removal to Winnipeg, the Commissioners, after a careful consideration of the cucumstances of the case express the following as the conclusion to which they have come .-That it would be injurious to the efficiency of the College to divide the time and labours of its professors divide the time and labours of its professors between Ixidonan and Winnipeg; that Winnipeg and not Kildonan is the place where the College should be situated; that the General Assembly enjoin that the teaching in connection with the College be conducted wholly in Winnipeg so soon as equitable arrangement can be effected in reference to the present building; that the following be the arrangement in regard to the latter matter:—That the building be given to the parall of Kildonan, to be used as a manse, that the debt on the building, to the amount of \$1,000, be raised and paid in the proportion of one third each, by the in the proportion of one third each, by the following parties, viz:—the parish of Kildonan, the Board of Management of Manitoba College, and the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

The reports were received and referred to Committee.

SIXTH DIET-MORNING SEDERUNT.

The Assembly met at 11 o'clock. After devotional exercises and the reading and confirmation of the minutes.

Rev. R. Hamilton read the report of the Committee on the Kankakee mission, from which it appeared that St. Ann had a population of 400, the inhabitants being chiefly Freuch Canadians. When they settled they were Roman Catholics, but now the great majority were Protestants. There were four Protestant churches in the villages.

The report was referred to a Committee.

Rev. W. Reid presented the report of the Committee on French Evangelization. This report was referred to the same Committee that to wince the report on the Kaukakee Mission had been referred.

Rev. W. Reid read the report of the Committee on the consolidation of the St. Ann, Kankakee, and French evangelization work. In the present state of the negotiations in regard to union it was considered mexpedient to enter on the consideration of the larger question.

After some discussion, the report was re-ferred to the same Committee as that to which the other reports had been referred. It was then agreed that Mr. Chiniquy be heard up to the hour of adjournment.

Rev. C. Rev. Principal Caven explained that when Mr. Jameson took the position of missionary to British Columbia at \$600 a year an addition of \$100 was made by the Home Missionary Committee. During the past year the congregation had contributed only \$463 instead of \$600, so that it was \$137 in \$1.14 Hz thought the report was now debt. The total receipts had been sionary. The total receipts had been \$12,085 which with a balance from last year of \$5,150, made a total of \$17,235; the payment left a balance in hand of \$8421. The Committee recommended that a third missionary should be sent to China.

The report was received and referred to a Special Committee.

Rev. Prof. Gregg bore testimony to Dr. Fraser's attainments and the success lie had met with in Knox College.

Rev. J. McCall urged that Dr. Fraser should visit several of the congregations before his departure.

Rev. J. Thompson, of Sarnia read the report of the Sabbath School Committee. He said it was gratifying to see that more interest was being taken in Sabbath-schools. Every one under sixteen years of age should be connected with Sabbath-schools or Bible classes. Those comprised half the population. He thought it would be better that the Assembly should be less tedious in discussing technicalities, fighting extract Satans, and should give more time to such practical matters as this. He hoped the Assembly would devote a sederunt to the discussion of this matter.

Rev. R. Torrance moved the thanks of the Assembly to the Committee, especially to the Convener, and the reference of the report to a Select Committee.

Rev. J. R. Watt, in seconding the motion complained that these select committees seldom suggested anything practical.

Motion agreed to.
