1. He received an appointment in the Canadian Expeditionary Force to recruit a battalion of infantry in Parry Sound district.
2. Gazette No. 9, January 27, 1916, with effect from January 21, 1916. 167th Battalion, C.E.F.
3. Temporary rank of lieutenant-colonel.
4. Yes.

5. In Canada about 11 months, partly at Niagara camp, Niagara-on-the-Lake. Served with the Canadian Expeditionary Force from date of appointment as lieutenant-colonel to the time he returned to Canada, May 14, 1917, to attend session of Parliament. Was attached to 1st Canadian Battalion, Overseas. Served in England 2 months, and in France, at the front, about 4 months. (Holds field officer's certificate, infantry, and equitation qualification.)

6. He has been paid the pay and allowances of his rank in the Canadian Expeditionary Force, and his wife has drawn separation allowance.

7. Pay and allowances of rank while in Canada, \$2,478.25. Separation allowance to Mrs. Arthurs, \$1,258. Total, \$3,736.25.

A cable has been sent to the Chief Paymaster, Overseas, asking for amount paid him there. No reply received yet.
