PETITION OF RIGHT ACT

ABOLITION OF GOVERNOR GENERAL'S FIAT

Mr. Garson: The main purpose of the amendments to the Petition of Right Act which are proposed in this bill is to provide for the abolition of the governor general's fiat which is now required before a petition of right can be proceeded with.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES ACT

GENERAL REVISION-AUTHORITY FOR CLASSIFY-ING WEIGHING AND MEASURING DEVICES, ETC.

Right Hon. C. D. Howe (Minister of Trade and Commerce) moved for leave to introduce Bill No. 193, respecting weights and measures.

He said: Mr. Speaker, the present Weights and Measures Act was passed, I believe, about 1873. The purpose of this bill is to bring the measures up to date, and particularly to bring the language of the act into conformity with the language used today. It is proposed that if and when the bill is given second reading it will be sent to a committee for detailed study.

Motion agreed to and bill read the first time.
