That this House urges the Postmaster General to arrange for renewed discussions between management and the Canadian Union of Postal Workers for the purpose of making a serious effort to resolve the differences respecting casual workers, in the hope that by doing so a strike by the CUPW can be avoided.

REQUEST FOR MEASURES TO MAINTAIN PRICE OF HEATING OIL—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Eudore Allard (Rimouski): Mr. Speaker, under Standing Order 43, I ask the unanimous consent of the House to introduce a very urgent motion demanding the application of immediate steps.

Considering that the price of oil and oil products will probably increase during the next months and that some oil products are more important than others for all Canadian consumers such as fuel, since all Canadians must heat their house, according to the changes of temperature, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Abitibi (Mr. Laprise):

That this House consider the steps to be taken so that the prices of some essential oil products such as fuel will not be increased, in order to enable all Canadians to heat their home at a reasonable price.

Mr. Speaker: The House has heard the motion of the hon. member. Under Standing Order 43, this motion

requires the unanimous consent of the House. Is there such a consent?

That this House consider the means to be taken to help spare parts agents maintain stocks at reasonable prices, so as to avoid constant rise in production costs, thereby helping combat inflation.
