Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): The National Harbours Board advises as follows: The National Harbours Board permits goods subject to wharfage charges to be delivered before the actual amounts which are due and payable are collected as a convenience to vessel operations. The penalty for failure to remit within the prescribed period continues to be at the rate of 10 per cent as a deterrent to abuse of this privilege.
