a large tin box, containing many interesting souvenirs of her grandparents. Among these were a silver spoon, with the monogram

> P. B. H.:

stout leather-bound volumes of Wesley's Sermons, dated 1770; Wesley's Journal, dated 1743; General Haldimand's "discharge" of Paul Heck from the volunteer troops, etc. But of special interest was the old German black-letter Bible, bearing the following clearwritten inscription: "Paul Heck, sein buch, ihm gegeben darin zu lernen die Neiderreiche sprache. Amen." The printed music of the psalter at the end of the book was like that described by Longfellow in Priscilla's psalmbook:

This, it is almost certain, is the very Bible which Barbara Heck held in her hands when she died.

Just opposite the elegant home of Mr.

[&]quot;Rough-hewn angular notes, like stones in the wall of a churchyard,

Darkened and overhung by the running vine of the verses."
