WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Great Britain today took steps to encourage commerce with her ports and thru the British embassy announced that as little suppression of shipping would be done as possible.

The statement follows:
"In order to prevent loss to subjects of neutral powers and to encourage continuance of trade, the British Government has taken steps to set free expeditiously and without reference to prize court as many cargoes as possible, even the in some cases cargoes may be liable in law to condemnation as prizes. IMMIGRATION DECLINES OVER FIFTY PER CENT.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—Immigration
has fallen off 58 per cent. owing to the
war and to the restricting of immi-
gration to farmers, agricultural
laborers and domestics. During April,
May, June and July there were 305,
331 immigrants, composed of 32,913
British, 34,836 American and 35,888
from other countries.

For the same months, 1913, the total
immigration was 250,906, com-
posed of 29,114 British, 54,004 Ameri-
can and 97,782 from other countries.

WAS UNWILLING TO MOVE RETIREMENT OF CHIEF

Alderman F. S. Spence Wants Re-
