There is a rift in the hockey situation in London. The Western University team absorbed last year's London team at the beginning of the season and signed all the players. The town players claim they have been sidetracked in favor of the college players, and have not been given a chance to make the team or to play. These players have withdrawn from the Western University Club and organized their own club, and wish to get a place in another O. H. A. group. They have made their application and submitted a list of their officers and players, as follows: President, Geo. J. Chantler; vice-president, Basil Sterling; secretary, J. A.
