ITALIANS CHARGE HILL

Carry Some Trenches Close to Summit of Monte Cukla.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Aug. 29.-News of what seems to indicate preparations for an Austrian retreat from the Italian frontier in the Val Sugana region is conveyed by a statement in the Sunday's official report of the Italian general staff, which states that the Austrians destroyed several bridges on the main highroad, and the railway at the bottom of the Sugana Valley, between Roncegno and Novaldo.

In the upper Isonzo region, the Italian Alpine troops carried a few trenches on Monte Cukla, west of Monte Rombon, some being situated on a summit 7000 feet high. Desperate resistance was offered by the Austrians, whose stand was favor-ed by the difficult nature of the terrain, and the enemy resorted to the throwing of hand grenades and the rolling down of

great boulders on the heads of the storming columns.

The charge did not succeed in driving the charge did not succeed in driving the suc The charge did not succeed in driving the enemy completely from the summit of the mountain, and he is still lodged at the extreme apex, but the Italians have now crept close to these remaining positions, so as to be able to rush them when opportunity offers.

In order to relieve pressure elsewhere, the Austrians attempted to storm Monte Almentera, but were repulsed in ferce fighting, which did not last very long.

An Italian aerial squadron bombarded the Aisevissa aerodrome with 120 bombs. Two sheds were hit and fire broke out in several places, ravaging the entire camp. All the attacking aeroplanes escaped without being hit.
