Effective and most becoming to the slim young devotee is the "all-white" costume which has gained such favor in a few short weeks. The woman who chooses a white suit of broad-cloth velvet, or plush for winter will also don a chic white hat, gorgeous white fox or ermine fur, soft white kid boots, and all her accessories will be in white—lacking the vaguest hint of color, and only occasionally a little introduction of black patent or jet. The suit most in demand is fashioned from broadcloth, and trimmed chiefly with buttons. The belt and overblouse were in slightly fitted peasant design, worn over a chiffon under bodice with sleeves widening at the wrist and trimmed with narrow bands of fox. GOVERNMENT HOUSE IS ALMOST READY

Will Be Occupied by Lieutenant-Governor and Family in Few Days

SOME ELEGANT SUITES

The Interior Decorations and Furnishings Reveal Taste of Connoisseurs.

It is anticipated that the new government house will be sufficiently ready to receive his honor the lieutenant-governor, his wife and daughter and their suite in a very few days. Many months have been devoted to the building and equipping of this important establishment, which will henceforth be the official residence and home of the king's representative in Ontario. To the T. Eaton Company, Limited, has been granted the privilege of providing the furnishings and interior decorations of government house, a task that could only be successfully carried out by most expert connoisseurs.

The interior of the house lends itself to most effective treatment, and a tour through the elegant suites from that set apart for royal visitors to the great basement apartments, in which are situated cold storage plants, cooling and heating systems and cleaning apparatus, revealed government house in a state rapidly nearing completion. The approach, the circular vestibule and grand hall recall pictures of early oriental luxury. On passing beneath the doors of the main entrance the visitor finds himself gazing into a large square hall, with walls, stairways and pillars of marble, upper walls and curved ceilings of cream and gold, a skylight window of initial glass, and below floors of inlaid mosaic.

The first room leading off the main hall is the official room of his honor the lieutenant-governor. Like all the rooms on the ground floor, the woodwork is turned oak, handsomely paneled, and hand-carved over doors, recesses, etc. In this room the walls are plain, the electroluxes bronze and the furnishings walnut. The hangings, fixtures and rugs in drawing and reception rooms are arranged, these two adjoining apartments being carried out in soft pinks—with satin paneled walls, cur-glass hanging lights, gold torch candelabra, beautiful gray marble mantels and deep velvet ax-minster rug in exquisite pale tints. Several of the rooms on this floor have mantels in Caen stone, the one built into the ceiling in the paneled oak dining room being ornamented with the Ontario coat of arms. Here the electroluxes are in old silver, and the crown beams of the ceiling decorated with a group design bronze painted in colors.

Upstairs are the sleeping apartments, private sitting rooms and the royal suite. This includes an effective bed-chamber in Rosebud Barry hangings with deep cream enamel furnishing, gold trimmed, with walls in pale cream and white enamel paneling. The sitting room in the royal suite is Japanese in design and hangings. The walls have panels of raw silk in Japanese garden patterns and the lounge and chairs of mahogany are upholstered in the same material. An unusual combination is noticed in the upper hall where mahogany doors are framed in carved oak.

The servants' quarters are comfortable and attractively decorated, the walls being in pale greens and cream and the furnishings enamelled wood.

The ballroom, with French windows and side recesses leading into the white palm room, has a beautiful inlaid hardwood floor, satin panels and woodwork of cream and ivory. The chandeliers are of gold and cut-glass and there is an effective upper balcony with three recesses overlooking the floor below.

Apart from the exquisite taste in many suites, much importance is attached to the culinary and domestic departments. The kitchens and pantries are floored with red brick tile and the walls are of white glazed tile. There are store rooms and a basement equipped with all the newest contrivances essential for the running of such an establishment.

WILL SEND GREETING TO MEN AT THE FRONT

Christmas Mail Service to Be Held at Massey Hall Earlier Than Usual.

Owing to shipping arrangements it is desirable to send Christmas mail to Great Britain and the overseas contingents somewhat earlier this year. Consequently, arrangements have been made for the great united Christmas mail service to be held in Massey Hall on Sunday afternoon next. This is one week earlier than in the three previous years.

The Right Rev. Bishop of Toronto has promised to preach the sermon, His lordship's text will constitute the Christmas message to distant friends and the boys at the front, and will be printed on a suitable Christmas card with greetings from Toronto. Three thousand of these greeting cards will be issued to those present as in former years.

The musical arrangements will be carried out under the direction of R. G. Stapells, organist and choir-master of the Church of the Messiah, who will be supported by the entire strength of his choir. Albert Downing will be the soloist. Special music for the vesper has been written by Mr. Stapells and dedicated to the British and Foreign Sailors' Society, under whose auspices these annual Christmas message services are held.

The officiating clergymen this year will be Rev. Andrew Robertson, D. D., of St. James' Presbyterian Church; Rev. W. T. Graham, D. D.; Rev. Alfred Hall, senior chaplain for Canada of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society; Rev. Isaac Tovell, D. D.; and service is fixed for three o'clock and all seats will be open free to the public.

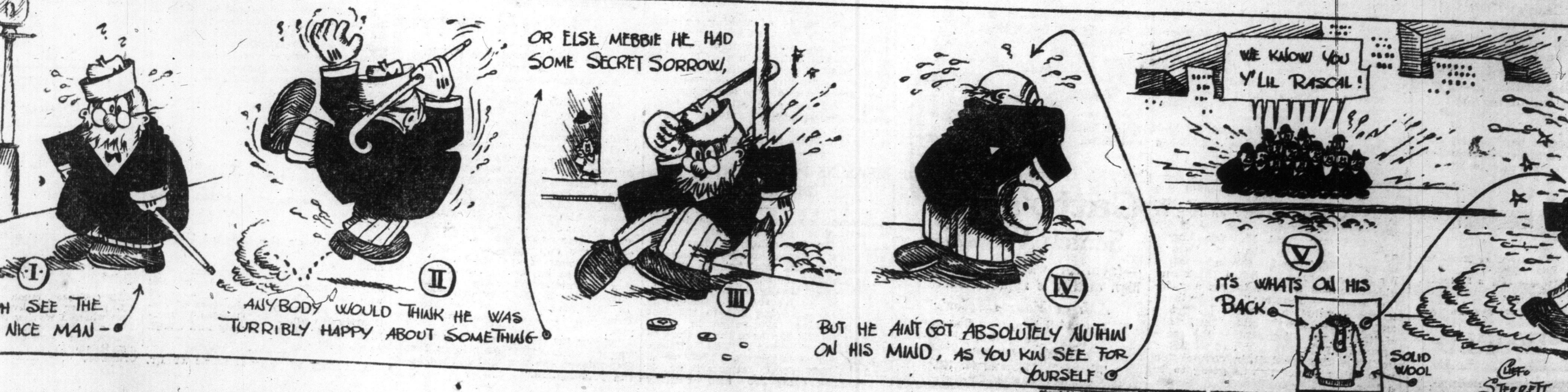
