The College has not only benefited by the change, but * * Of this I am convinced, that no man could have done better than Mr. Bell, and that just in proportion to his merits would be the opposition raised against him. I have frequently attended his lectures in the Arts Department when perfect order was kept. Though so young he has given the most gratifying evidence of his future eminence as a lecturer and man of science. He has stood the ordeal through which he has passed most nobly."
