It is stated that no reports were made to the provincial board of health. Samples of water from some of the wells have been sent to the provincial authorities by me and the provincial authorities author reported upon. HUTTON'S SYSTEM PRAISED. Daring Innovation Justified by It ess, Says Col. Stone.
