BUYING UP PULPWOOD FOR BIG PAPER TRUST

Wisconsin Men Leave for Eastern Canada to Look Over Desirable Tracts.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 14.—The purchase of great tracts of pulpwood in Canada, in the vicinity of Quebec, will be it is now expected, part of the plan of the men who are engineering the merger of the paper mills of Wisconsin, Minnesota and Michigan into a corporation with a capital of thirty million dollars.

The need of a reserve forest of pulpwood is one of the controlling elements in the formation of the trust, it has been learned that three expert timber estimators were here recently, and after a midnight conference with J. G. Hanrahan, who is engineering the merger, and some of the big mill owners, they left for Canada, where, it is said, they will estimate and appraise the timber owned by the different manufacturers who are to enter the combine.

GIRL SHOTS DOWN MAN WHO HAD MURDERED WIFE

Man and Woman Dead and Daughter Held for Trial—A New York Tragedy.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—A family shooting affray, in which George Washer and his wife were probably fatally shot, caused much excitement in Harlem to-day. Washer, who had been separated from his wife for several years, returned home to-day and upbraided her for having caused his arrest for murdering her.

Washer drew revolver and fired at his daughter Annie, who then opened fire on her father, pursuing him from room to room. Washer turned several times and fired at his daughter.

When Miss Langlois was arraigned before Magistrate House for shooting her father, she said: "My father was shooting at my mother, so I sent Annie, my younger sister, to fetch a revolver. My father was still firing at my mother when I was given the revolver. I asked for it and it was not until I saw the burning clothes on my mother's breast and heard her cries that I raised my revolver and fired at her."

The woman fell back in her chair. No one had told her that her mother had just died. Magistrate House was in tears, and directed that the probation officer find some home for Mrs. Langlois and her sister until the coroner needed her.

The magistrate said he would not send her to prison, and said that he would aid her all he could.

RUSSIA AND JAPAN REACH SOLID TERMS

Terms of New Convention Are Received With Favor in St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 15.—The Russo-Japanese convention, which was signed by M. Jawolasky, the Russian minister of foreign affairs, and Baron Motono, the Japanese minister to Russia, on July 30 last, was published to-day.

The governments of the emperor of Russia and the emperor of Japan, and animated by a desire to strengthen the peaceful, friendly and neighborly relations which happily have been restored between Russia and Japan, and to remove the possibility of future misunderstandings between the empires, have entered into the following agreements:

"Article I.—Each contracting party undertakes to respect the present territorial integrity of the other, as stipulated in the treaty signed at Portsmouth, N.H., Sept. 5, 1905, and in the special conventions concluded between the two empires."

"Article II.—Both contracting parties recognize the independence and territorial integrity of the Chinese empire and pledging the two countries to the maintenance of the status quo and the respect of this principle with all the peaceful means at their disposal."

The Conservative and Liberal newspapers display remarkable unanimity in agreeing that it establishes the relations between the two powers on a sound basis, guaranteeing unbroken peace for a long period.

The news also expresses the opinion that the treaty is the turning point in Russia's Asiatic policy, enabling her to shift her attention hereafter to nearer Russia, after having carefully weighed the arguments in favor of waging a return war for the recovery of lost ground in Manchuria, and having finally decided to accept the situation as it is, abandoning all ideas of a war of revenge.

The Russia characterizes the treaty as a link in the chain of international agreements removing the menace of war in the far east.

TOKIO, Aug. 15.—It is believed here that the Russo-Japanese treaty includes a clause, which has not been published specifically, defining the respective spheres of influence of the two countries. Under this clause it is reported that a portion of the Suihari River is placed within Japan's sphere, thereby modifying the exclusive rights of navigating that stream, which were conferred upon Russia by the treaty of Aigun.

MANSFIELD NO BETTER. LYON MOUNTAIN, N.Y., Aug. 15.—Richard Mansfield is not improving in health, and those close to him reluctantly admit their conviction that the actor will never again be seen on the stage.

Dr. Lemieux, the distinguished Canadian physician, who was summoned here to attend Mr. Mansfield when the latter's condition aroused apprehensions, declined to discuss the case.
