

He said the schooner had capsized early in the morning six days before. The wreck had been floating on its beam ends a long time and had gradually settled in the water un-til she floated upright, her mast projecting above water. When first sighted, the man appeared to be a black bundle or ball, as he was huddled up and apparently very weak.
