Aug. 1 to take up his residence in Spain.

Mr. Palmer is an old Nova Scotia boy,

and has many friends in Toronto, where

he has a brother. He has been for some

time mining engineer for the B.A.C., at

Roseland, and goes to Spain to take a

position as mining engineer in charge of the

underground work of the Rio Tinto mines.

Mr. W. A. Carpio, formerly general manager

of the Rio Tinto, is now general manager

of the Rio Tinto, and sent for Mr. Palmer.

Moyle to the Front.

Moyle, a little town on the Crow's Nest

Railway, in East Kootenay, B.C., is pro-

gressing. The Moyle Leader says:

Moyle's pay roll for the month of June

was the largest in the history of the camp.

The St. Eugene Consolidated Company

alone paid out \$21,000. With the pay roll

of Park, Mitchell & Co., which amounted

to \$10,000, the total amount paid out

for the month of June was \$31,000.

This amount, for a town of a population

of 600, means an average of \$50 per head

for every man, woman and child in the

place. Is it any wonder then, that Moyle

is the most prosperous town for its size

in British Columbia?
