Continued From Page 1. think that any firm or bank, even small ones, would fail as a result of the Seventh's suspension. It was said this afternoon that the Seventh National had quick assets of about \$1,000,000. It was further reported that the depositors would not lose anything.

Depositors Will Be Paid. Guy G. Major, formerly President of the American Lumber Company, is one of the Directors of the Seventh National Bank. He said he would be a couple of days before it would be possible to determine whether the bank could ever resume business.

Resources Over \$5,000,000. The following statement of liabilities and resources was given out to-night at the bank: Resources—Loans and discounts, \$3,500,000; U. S. bonds, to secure circulation, and deposits, \$500,000; premiums, \$21,474.34; stocks and securities, \$123,623.85; banking house, \$4000; due from banks, \$455,521.88; cash and exchanges, \$467,044.25; 8 per cent. U. S. Redemption Fund, \$1,150,000. Total, \$5,165,580.12.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, June 27.—Comptroller Davies today ordered the closing of the Seventh National Bank of New York and appointed Forrest R. Taylor, National Bank Examiner, temporary receiver. Later the comptroller made the following statement: Comptroller Davies stated on Tuesday he received word from the National Bank Examiner that Henry Marquand & Co. had recently become indebted to a large amount, making \$1,000,000 to the Seventh National Bank of New York, which was secured by collateral of a doubtful nature. Information received on Wednesday of further information of the National Bank Examiner that Henry Marquand & Co. have loans of approximately \$1,000,000. Unless promptly and satisfactorily repaid and cash therefor put into the bank by Saturday night, June 29, I will appoint a receiver for the bank. Please convene your board of directors and announce this to them."

THE DEATHS OF A DAY. Well-known Toronto Trades Unionist Dies in Chicago—Successful Butcher Passes Away. Many will regret to hear of the death of William H. Christie, who died in Chicago, after a brief illness. Mr. Christie was one of the best known trades unionists in Toronto, and for many years was a delegate to the District Labor Council. He organized in Toronto several years ago a branch of the International Waters' Alliance, and for some time filled the office of secretary. About a year ago he removed to Chicago, where he had resided up till the time of his death. At the last annual convention of the International Waters' Alliance in St. Louis, Mr. Christie was elected first vice-president. He was 35 years of age. Besides a widow, he leaves two children. The remains arrived in the city last night. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the residence of his sister, Mrs. Mary Munnice, 15 Williams-street.

Richardson was the only Strathcona trooper serving in South Africa to receive the coveted decoration for valor, the Victoria Cross. Trouble Over a Hydrant. Mrs. Ann McGinnis of the rear of 154 Centre-street was taken to St. Michael's Hospital yesterday, suffering from a severe attack of cholera. Outside of Mr. McGinnis's house, there is a hydrant, and, on Wednesday, she noticed a neighbor drawing water from it. Grimsby Berries at Ottawa. It is reported that several men were forced by the flames into the creek and drowned. It is the only one person known to be injured was Lewis Casson, a Canadian. Elevator and Wheat Burned.
