ASSESSMENT COMMISSION MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS

Real Property Should be Assessed at Its Actual Value—Abolish Tax on Personality Other Than Income—Single Tax Declared Not to be Practicable.

The report of the Ontario Assessment Commission was presented to the legislature yesterday afternoon by the Provincial Secretary...

1. That real property be assessed at its actual value, including mineral lands and the real property of all corporations...

2. That the assessment and taxation of personal property, other than income, be abolished.

3. That in lieu of a tax on personal property the following method of taxation be adopted: (a) Tax all persons...

4. Impose in cities, towns and villages, as a supplementary tax, a tax on all owners of houses...

5. That in cities, towns and villages, every person in possession of any business or occupation, in lieu of assessing his income...
