Deputations Wait on West York Commissioners in Regard to Deer Park Hotel.

Toronto Junction, May 10.—The West. York License Commissioners met this morning to hear argument as to the granting of a license to the Deer Park Hotel kept by Mr. O'Hallorian, The latter was represented by his solicitor, Mr. Patterson represented those opposed. A large number of residents of Deer Park were present, those opposed to granting the licenses predominating. "Deer Park is a residential district, pure and simple, and there is no need for an hotel there, 'said Miles Vokes, Mr. Jennings said the petition should have been put in by the 15th of April to be considered, and consequently the commissioners should not consider it. "The Deer Park Hotel has been carried on for 45 years, and there has not been a single conviction registered against it." When local option was voted on in York Township the Deer Park section went against it by 3 to 1. E. W. D. Butler said he had lived in that neighborhood about 19 years, and the had never yet seen anything out of the way about the hotel. He represented himself and Mrs. McCulla, the latter living 66 feet from the hotel, and who said she had seen "no cause for complaint." The commissioners will give their decision to-morrow.
