Liberated Pigeons

Windsor, Oct. 22.-As many as were alive of about 400 pigeor were liberated at the Canadian Express office in Windsor yesterday. The birds were shipped from Tavistock, Ont., to John Marcon, Sandwich, but the latter refused to accept the shipment, claiming the birds had been sent before they were ordered.

As the pigeons had been kept in crates for several days the express agent wired the shipper at Tavistock and was told to liberate the birds. When the cages were opened it was found that about 200 of the birds had died for want of food and water. The others were so weak from hunger that they could not fly any distance, and the G. T. R. yards were filled with boys who formed a pigeon hunting party. Many of the birds were captured, while those who had sufficient strength circled around the tracks all day, alighting at intervals to pick up the grain which was dropped from the cars.

Orders To Beintroduced.

SPAIN AND THE CHURCH

Madrid, Oct. 22.-The bill defining the ister of public worship; M. Barthou, poisoning and typhoid germs, declaring relations of the Church and the State, to provisions: No religoius order to be established

without parliamentary authorization. The state will support any member of a religious order who may wish to renounce the vows. The Minister of Justice may withdraw the authorization of any order he may

find to be dangerous to morality or public tranquility. The cabinet will examine all authorizations granted previous to the passage of the law, and cancel all which it may find illegal.

Religious orders the members of which are foreigners, or the directors of which reside abroad, will be dissolved. The Government authorities shall have power to enter monasteries at any time

Strict limitation shall be placed upon sums of money given to orders by members on admission or by charitable subscription.

All legacies or donations to religious

orders directly or through intermediaries,

are strictly prohibited.

Orders which engage in trade or industry shall pay the regular taxes. HURRICANE IN HONDURAS
