## MR. CROUSE'S CLAIM

Mr. Essery's Statement in Regard to It -Reduction of Builders' Rates Recommended.

The regular meeting of the water commissioners was somewhat lively yesterday. Mr. E. T. Essery charged the commissioners with base conspiracy, and said he was about to issue a writ against the city if arbitration was not agreed upon to settle the claim of John W. Crouse, of Byron, against the city. When the Griffith springs were bought, he said, Mr. Griffith agreed to pay one-half the law costs or damages that might be incurred through Mr. Crouse, and now that the latter has submitted his that the latter has submitted his claim, city Solicitor Meredith con-sulted Mr. Griffith's solicitors. It was agreed that arbitration should settle the matter; but Mr. Crouse wanted a proviso that in the event of the arbitrators taking a wrong view of the law an appeal could be made to the judge. Mr. Griffith's lawyers could not

judge. Mr. Griffith's lawyers could not see their way to grant them.

Mr. Essery said he thought he had been dealing with the board, but found he had to deal with outside parties, who were interfering in the matter. He would find out what right the city of London had to conspire with a third party.

Chairman Jones replied that there was no conspiracy, and that Mr. Griffith's solicitors were consulted simply

fith's solicitors were consulted simply because Mr. Griffith was interested financially. No action taken. Superintendent Moore recommended

that the rates charged builders should be reduced, as follows: Cubic yard, for concrete, from 12 to 5 cents; stone, per cord, measured in wall, 12 to 8 cents; cement walks or floors, per square yard, when not exceeding six inches in thickness, 3 to 1 cent. Action deferred for a week.
On the recommendation of Mr. Moore,

the hydrant at the corner of Pali Mall and Maitland streets will be moved outside the sidewalk. Thomas Ralph's application for a main on Leslie street, West London, was referred to the superintendent. Robert Hueston, liveryman, appealed against the charge of \$34 32 for one service at his stable. An investigation showed that the increase was due to

a leak in the pipe, and the board agreed to deduct one-half the difference in the two accounts. The report presented by Engineer Findlay for the two weeks ended Nov. 20, showed that 35,503,592 gallons had been pumped. The depth of water in the reservoir had never been less than 10 feet 6 inches, and the greatest

depth was 13 feet. Mr. Levi Lewis applied for a refund of rates charged for a vacant house in South London. Referred to the superintendent to report. Members present: Commissioners Jones (chairman) and Little, and Mayor Wilson. Secretary Ellwood and Mr. Moore were also in attendance.
