CANADA'S SURPLUS

Ottawa, May 11.-The monthly financial statement of the Dominion, handed out yesterday afternoon, giving receipts and expenditures up to April 31 in connection with the fiscal year ending March 31 last, is the most encouraging statement ever issued in the history of the Dominion. Final returns for the year are not yet in, but it is safe to say that when the books for the year are finally closed they will show a surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure of over \$18,000,000, and a net reduction of debt during the nine months, constituting the last fiscal period, amounting to about \$7,500,000. Hon. Mr. Fielding in his budget speech of November last estimated the surplus at \$13,000,000. A betterment of \$5,000,000 between that estimate and the actual results is a striking evidence of the prosperity of the country, and the rapidly-growing revenues. In his November budget the Finance Minister estimated the total revenues for the year on ordinary account would be \$65,000,000, and the total expenditure on consolidated fund account \$52,000,000, and on capiaccount \$12,500,000. The statement of receipts to date March 31 shows a total revenue of \$67.138.594. It is expected that another \$2,000,000 will still come in to be credited to the past receipts for the fiscal year about the estimate of November last.
