NEW OWEN SOUND DOCK

OWEN SOUND, Sept. 16.—Work will be started, it is stated, almost immediately upon the new dock on the east side of the Owen Sound harbor. It was authorized about a year ago, and an appropriation of \$50,000 has been made for it. It will be of concrete, and will be nearly 1,000 feet long. The contract has been let to a Port Huron firm. When completed, all the waterfront owned by the Government will have concrete dockage.

CROWDS ON STAND THURSDAY LARGER THAN EVER BEFORE

Yesterday's Attendance Falls But Few Thousand Behind Wednesday's—Effect of Reduced Prices Today Being Awaited With Greatest of Interest.

While the general impression of careful observers is that Thursday's attendance at the Western Fair fell a few thousand short of the attendance on Wednesday, it is unquestioned that there were at least 40,000 people on the grounds yesterday. Estimates of Wednesday's attendance ranged as high as 60,000. The grandstands, both Thursday afternoon and evening, were packed even more closely than for Wednesday's performances, and the crowds on the grounds appeared almost as great yesterday as on the preceding day.

Secretary A. M. Hunt stated last night that the attendance for the two days, Wednesday and Thursday together, would easily exceed 100,000 people.

lack of patronage, and most of the riding devices were operating with capacity passenger traffic.

Perhaps never before has the Western Fair gathered together so many excellent horses, pure bred stock, and sheep and swine. Although Wednesday was regarded as Farmers' Day, the agricultural buildings Thursday were attracting practically as many fair visitors as on Wednesday.

The gate throngs were not evident Thursday at the Dundas street entrance to the grounds, but this was not due so much to a lower attendance as to the operation of more change booths, so that there was less delay or standing in line to get one's money changed into the requisite fifty-cent pieces necessary to pass through the turnstiles.

The bursting of a water main or sewer pipe near the Administration Building created some inconvenience Wednesday evening, but was repaired. Evidently a fresh break had occurred yesterday for another refreshment booth-keeper found his premises entirely surrounded by a small lake of water, and a plank platform or wharf had to be laid to permit customers to reach his counter without wading through mud and water.

Took Their Time.
Although the grounds were well crowded early in the forenoon the fair visitors appeared more leisurely, and were more evenly distributed over the grounds. The tractor and machinery exhibitions were again surrounded by throngs; the pure food show and the Main Building were well filled with sightseers; the games of chance were doing a fair business, and the dining halls were filled even before noon.

The directors admitted they were well pleased with the morning attendance, and anticipated double or triple the crowd in the afternoon and evening. The parking space in the interior of the race course was nearly half occupied as early as 11 o'clock. Some of the private parking spaces outside the grounds appeared to be doing even a better business than Wednesday.

At the directors' luncheon yesterday two special speakers were Dr. Chas. D. Gray, of the Canadian-American Waterways Association, and Mr. Fodd, of the Canadian Packers' Association, Toronto. Both made brief speeches complimenting the Fair board upon the success of this year's exhibition.

BRIBE OF \$300 ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED

Tecumseh Man and Express Agent Arrested by License Officers.

WINDSOR, Sept. 16.—Investigations of Special Inspector Hallam, an operative sent here by the Ontario License Commission to assist in checking activities of the rum-runners, resulted today in the arrest of Paul Labut of Riverside Drive, near Tecumseh, and his release on \$2,000 bail, on a charge of a breach of the Ontario temperance act.

His rearrest on a charge of bribery and his final incarceration in the county jail followed, and seizure was made of cases of liquor and four barrels of beer in the cellar of his home.

Justin Collins, Canadian Express Company agent at Walkerville, who was implicated in the case when he released a shipment to Labut, was arrested later on a charge of accepting a \$300 bribe to deliver the liquor without informing the license officers.

WALKERVILLE'S QUANDARY

WINDSOR, Sept. 16.—After emphatically refusing to co-operate with Windsor City Council in its fight against the proposed increase in the rates of the Union Gas Company, Walkerville Town Council today retraced its steps and forwarded to Toronto an appeal to the Government to take over and operate the gas field in Kent County district. The company recently threatened to cut off the supply of gas on the border unless the rates were increased from 30 cents to \$1 per 1,000 cubic feet. Walkerville is particularly embarrassed in its fight against the company, in that Mayor Charles S. King is one of the heads of the Windsor Gas Company, local distributing agency of the Union Gas Company.
