COUNSEL PROTESTS AGAINST ACCUSED **GIVING TESTIMONY**

But Little Light Thrown On Circumstances Surrounding Fatal Accident.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—At the resumed inquest here tonight on the death of William Rossiter of Toronto, who was fatally injured by an automobile on the Toronto-Hamilton highway, near Port Credit, on the morning of September Region of the morning of september 1. W. A. Young, the coroner, and C. A. Kingston, counsel for Harry G. Barnes, who is charged with manslaughter in connection with Rossiter's death, occurred and occupied the greater part of the Araxes River (east of Erzerum). They appear also to be planning an atack session.

First Mr. Barnes, the accused, was called as a witness. His counsel vigorously protested that this was not arcording to British justice and that Barnes, being under arrest, though out on ball could not be compelled to testify in the case. Loadon, Oct. 9.—Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman both want to return to the United States, according to Boris Sokoloff, former professor of biology in Petrograd University, and well known as a socialist writer, who has just arrived in England.


