## CLOSE FINISHES RESULT AT POUGHKEEPSIE

Geers Lands Loyal a Winner in One of His Old Time Finishes.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Aug. 21.—Close finishes were in order at the Hudson River Driving Park this afternoon. The 214 trot in the first heat developed the most sensational finish of the week. ## PINKOLA BREAKS RECORD AT EMPIRE CITY TRACK

Wins Midsummer Stakes in 1:51 4-5, a Second Faster Than Track Record.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Pinkola, a west-coast colt, easily won the Midsummer Stakes, at a mile and an eighth, at Empire City to-day, and made a new record for the track for the distance by running it in 1:51.4-5, which is one second faster than the best previous time. Pinkola was backed down from 4 to 1 to 5 to 1. ## REAL SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

One Has Been Added to the Missouri State University.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 21.—Institutions of learning are watching the development of the proposed school of journalism of the Missouri State University, which is the pioneer in what Walter Williams of Columbia, dean of the venture, terms the "laboratory plan."

The plan outlined by Joseph Pulitzer was taken as the basis for the Missouri School, to specialize on courses in English, economics, sociology, political science and some other branches taught in the usual academic course, so as to give students of journalism what they most need, without burdening them with unnecessary details.

In conjunction with the lectures a daily newspaper, to be called The University Missourian, will be issued. It will be supplied with telegraphic service, either from the Associated Press or the United Press, and the students will do actual work in reporting and copy reading.

The course comprises four years and the students graduated will receive the degree of bachelor of science of journalism.
