It costs \$10.00 to record a claim.

have the story, and then the wonder ceases, why prospectors are irritated because the government charges them for logs to build a house.

And yet it's marvelous to live in the government charges them Gowganda, and witness the activity that never ceases, but increases, People of all descriptions are piling in here loaded with supplies, waiting until the canoe route opens.

They are all sitting on their haunches waiting to hear the ice crunch and the recorder's declamation that certain claims have been thrown open.

Then will commence such a feverish exodus to the west of here, that the Cobalt rush will be remembered more as a pleasure excursion to a country

It's generally conceded that very few of the men joining in the rush intend to develop claims or even do assess-ment work on them. This concession is given guardedly and with some knowledge of the country around here and the staking that has already been

There are some men who are some with half a dozen licenses, with an idea of collecting and conglomerating claims fast as the work of doing it can be done, and this is apparent to anyone who travels thru.

There are hundreds of claims staked that have not been recorded, and never will be seed this course.

Then the contending parties, no doubt fearing the decision of the court of last resort, when one or other would inevitably be ousted, considered it wiser to come to a mutual understanding.
