MAYOR CHURCH AND HYDRO SCORE SWEEPING VICTORY Destruction of Houses Ordered in Ireland to Punish Outrages

Failure to Notify Authorities of Movements Will Be Severely Dealt With. ASSEMBLIES FORBIDDEN

Cork, Jan. 2.—Any person known to possess arms or ammunition must report the fact immediately or render himself liable to prosecution, Major General Sir Edward Strickland, commanding the troops in Munster, announced today in a notice issued here. It is also forbidden to assist rebels in any way, by providing them with food, clothing, vehicles or shelter. The order is effective Tuesday.

The people are warned that they must not fail to report the rebels and their movements without the slightest delay. Appearance before a military court is the alternative, the notice states, adding that the authorities are neutral and inconsistent with the position of the locality is punishable. It declares that persons who do not do their utmost to prevent damage to government property will be dealt with severely in person and in estate.

Germany's Retention of Civic Guards Also Reported by Marshal Foch.

Paris, Jan. 2.—Marshal Foch's report on Germany's disarmament, according to The Temps, says that the Germans have surrendered 41,000 cannon, 29,000 unmounted cannon barrels, 150,000 machine gun barrels, 2,800,000 rifles, 16,000 carbines and 25,000 airplane motors.

PLANNED UNION OF TRANSPORT MEN Project for Merger of All But Railway Workers Endorsed in London.

London, Jan. 2.—Unanimous support of a project to amalgamate all the different unions of transport workers excepting the railway men into one huge organization was voted in a resolution adopted today at a meeting in which all sections of the transport workers in London were represented.

THREE OF A FAMILY KILLED ON CROSSING TRAIN STRUCK AUTO

Were Driving From Home on Fourth Concession of York to Thornhill—Daughter Instantly Killed, Mother Died on Train and Son in the Hospital—Injuries of Henry Barnard, the Father, Comparatively Slight.

When the automobile, in which they were driving, was struck by a train at the G.T.R. public crossing one mile south of Elia, near Downsview road, in York County, on New Year's morning, Mrs. Louisa Barnard, aged 35, her daughter, Vera, aged seven, and her son Gordon, aged 12, all received fatal injuries. Henry Barnard, who was driving the auto, was stunned and received slight injuries about the body, but recovered soon after being admitted to the Grace Hospital, in Toronto, to leave.

James Reid, aged 75, roomer at 31 Duke street, was found dead in a room at 307 West King street, asphyxiated by illuminating gas fumes.

BALLOONISTS SAFE AT MOOSE FACTORY, HUDSON BAY POST

Crew of Three Officers Were Lost in Forest for Four Days. LEAVE BY DOG SLED

Rockaway, N.Y., Jan. 2.—The missing United States navy balloon A-5938, landed 10 miles northeast of Moose Factory, Ontario, December 14, and the crew of three men leave safe at a Hudson Bay trading post, according to a telegram received at the Naval air station here tonight.

MOOSE FACTORY, where the balloon landed, is located on James Bay at the mouth of the Moose River and is about 400 miles distant from New York on a direct line. The place is a trading post and outpost of the Hudson Bay Company.

MAJOR BEATS ALL RECORDS Hiltz and Nesbitt New Controllers—Ramsden and Cameron Snowed Under—Maguire's Remarkable Vote—Six New Faces in Council—Setback for "Frills and Fads"

THE REIGN OF THOMAS L. CHURCH as mayor of Toronto shows no indication of coming to a close thru waning popularity. By his success at the polls on Saturday he has established himself as the fourteenth Louis of Toronto history.

Carrying the field on Saturday by a majority of 16,000 over such a doughty opponent as Sam McBride, or about 10,000 better than his showing over the same opponent last year, was a distinct triumph for Mayor Church. The result indicates that the public took little notice of the attempt of Mr. McBride and his backers, the Toronto Star, to discredit the mayor in connection with the bonus \$1500 offered to him by the board of control six months ago. If this campaign had any effect at all it was the effect of a boomerang.

INDIA TO BOYCOTT VISIT OF CONNAUGHT

Nagpur, India, Jan. 2.—A boycott on the proposed visit of the Duke of Connaught to the east and a tribute to the memory of the late Lord Mayor MacSwiney, of Cork were voted in resolutions adopted by the Indian National Congress in session here.

Berlin, Jan. 2.—Dr. Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, former German imperial chancellor, died last night after a brief illness on his estate at Hohenfinow, near Berlin.

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SHORTEN HOURS AND EMPLOY MORE

British Government to Adopt Plan in Their Industrial Establishments.

London, Jan. 2.—In addition to other plans of relief for the vast army of unemployed workers, the cabinet proposes that the government's own industrial establishments shall be placed on short time to provide employment for the greatest possible number of work people. This will avoid further reductions of the government establishments and absorb many workers who already have been dismissed.
