VIOLATIONS OF FISHERIES ACT ON KOOTENAY RIVER— GOVERNMENT ACTION

Mr. Bob Brisco (Kootenay West): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of the Environment. As there have been violations of the federal Fisheries Act on the Kootenay River below Mica and there will follow similar violations if the Kootenay River diversion goes through, is the minister prepared to act other than through his provincial official with regard to federal legislation?

Hon. Len Marchand (Minister of State (Environment)): Mr. Speaker, I will have to take the question as notice and study it very carefully.

TRANSPORT

SUGGESTION FUNDS BE ADVANCED TO RAILWAYS TO BUY EQUIPMENT AND ALLEVIATE UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Les Benjamin (Regina-Lake Centre): Mr. Speaker, my question concerns a proposal I made to the Minister of Transport last July and which my leader made to the Minister of Finance during this parliament. I direct it to the Acting Prime Minister. There are a few thousand miles of railway lines in Canada that require upgrading. This will involve hundreds of steel rails, millions of ties, tie plates, anchors and so forth. In order to alleviate unemployment in the Atlantic provinces, particularly Cape Breton Island and Pictou county, will the government ensure that sufficient capital is advanced so that orders can be placed now by both the national railroads and Via Rail for the steel rails, equipment and other infrastructure that will be required over the next several years? That could be produced now and stockpiled in western Canada where it will be needed.

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I thank the hon, member for his suggestion. It is one upon which we have effectively acted already to the extent that it is reasonable. We have obtained \$100 million for the construction of branch lines in 1977 and 1978. That includes \$47 million for equipment which was ordered to be built at various plants across the country, including Hamilton and Trenton, Nova Scotia. In addition, Canadian National has taken some steps to advance orders and obtain rails ahead of their actual needs. The rail for the branch line program will largely be obtained in the prairies from those lines which the Hall commission recommended be abandoned. CN have been pursuing the matter of additional rail for their own on-going program, including double tracking where that is necessary, in line with the railway's very vigorous program of ensuring that all of the additional capacity for moving freight is available when it is needed. The railways have been doing a very good job on that. They should be applauded for ordering steel and rails in advance of their actual need.

DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR ATLANTIC AREA—DATE OF MEETING WITH PROVINCIAL MINISTERS TO DISCUSS IMPLEMENTATION

At the moment I am depending upon my colleague, the hon. Postmaster General.
