This handsome volume of 458 pages has been compiled by Victor Speers, a newspaper man of Buffalo, from information supplied him by John Wilson Murray, inspector of the department of criminal investigation of the department of justice, whose head office are in the parliament buildings of our own city.

The volume opens with a direct and vivid picture worthy of the pen of Dr. Conan Doyle. It was the occasion of the complete first experience with his hero. The scene was a tangled swamp on a farm near Earl, in the County of Waterloo, Province of Ontario, Canada.

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The man who discovered the plot was Murray, and it was he who unearthed the elaborate scheme which had been hatched in the city of Toronto.

In 1873 Detective Murray left home and came to Canada as head of the detective force of the Canada Southern Railway, with headquarters at St. Thomas.

The List of Candidates Seeking Office Rapidly Becoming Larger.

The situation in municipal election politics remains unchanged, and it is probable that no new candidates will be announced before nomination day.
