Iron That Endures Heating.
The some iron swells or grows from being repeatedly heated, as was pointed out several years ago, not all kinds do so.

In a report to the British Iron and Steel Institute, H. F. Ragan states that gray irons, containing 3.38 per cent. of carbon and 1.13 of silicon, rapidly weaken and change, and lose 75 per cent. of their strength in 90 heatings.

White irons, on the other hand, do not undergo such deterioration. An alloy, for instance, containing 3.08 per cent. of carbon, 0.12 of silicon, 0.13 of manganese, 0.018 of sulphur, and 0.01 of phosphorus, does not grow, but even becomes stronger and more ductile.

GERMAN-AMERICAN LINER IS AGROUND

Amerika, Outward Bound From New York, Sticks in Mud at Tompkinsville.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—The big Hamburg-American liner Amerika, outward bound, ran aground today off Tompkinsville, Staten Island, and immediately hoisted signals, signifying "not under control." The Amerika left her pier a few minutes after 8 o'clock this morning and began nosing her way down the harbor in a sixty-mile gale. Owing to last night's violent wind and its continuation today the tide was very low, nearly three feet below normal, and because of this the big vessel stuck in the mud. Sheltered as she was in the lee of Staten Island and the Brooklyn shore, her condition was not serious, and her commander hoped to float her with the rising tide late today.

THREE DEATHS FROM THE GALE

Woman Blown Under a Street Car, Painter Falls From Scaffold and Man Blown Into Newark Bay.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—At least three deaths and approximately \$500,000 property damage resulted from last night's 80-mile gale which swept New York and vicinity. This morning at 9 o'clock the wind had dropped to 60 miles an hour, but the mercury had crawled down to 32, and pedestrians suffered keenly.

The deaths reported were: Mrs. Mary Kline, Brooklyn, died of injuries after having been blown under a street car. Robert Walker, a painter, fatally injured in a fall from a scaffold in Brooklyn.

FIVE KILLED AT LEVEL CROSSING

Train Hits Carriage Outside Denison, Iowa—Two Others Will Die.

DENISON, Iowa, Jan. 4.—Five persons were killed and two probably fatally injured when a Chicago and Northwestern train struck a carriage, one mile from here shortly before midnight last night. The dead are: John Evers and his six-year-old son; John Reimers, his wife and five months old baby. The injured: John Reimers, aged six and Minnie Reimer, aged fourteen, were taken to a local hospital where it is stated neither can recover.

A sharp curve at a point just east of the crossing made it impossible for the engineer to see the carriage until it was too late to stop, and it is thought the noise of the vehicle made it impossible for the driver to hear the train approaching.
