

PRICES MOVE MODERATELY HIGHER ON MARKETS TODAY

PROFESSIONAL BUYING NOTED ON WALL STREET

Fractional Gains Recorded
for Several Popular
Stocks

Power Also Displays Steady
Tone; Laurentide Drops

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Stock prices worked moderately higher at the opening of today's market in response to professional buying, based on the theory that the recent decline had been over-extended. Fractional gains were recorded by such popular shares as DuPont, General Motors, Anaconda Copper and Union Pacific, with initial advances of a point or more in Tobacco Products and Case Threshing Machines. United States Steel opened lower, despite expectations of an increase in unfilled tonnage.

AT MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Oct. 9.—Trading in the opening of the local stock exchange this morning, over 3,000 shares of this issue changed hands during the first half hour. REDS DISTURB ROYAL EVENT IN DENMARK

Cause Interruption at Opera
During Visit of Finnish
Premier

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 9.—An untoward incident occurred last night to disturb the visit to the Danish court of the President of Finland, Dr. Lauri Rintala. A brilliant audience of diplomats, officials and prominent society personages had gathered at the Royal Opera House for a gala performance in honor of Dr. Rintala, who was sitting next to the king and queen in royal box, when suddenly there were shouts from the gallery. "Down with the bloodhounds from Helsinki!" (The Finnish capital). The disturbers were six young communists who showered scarlet handkerchiefs all over the hall from the balcony. One bundle fell in the lap of Queen Alexandra, who appeared frightened. King Christian and Dr. Rintala smiled, and the disturbance was drowned by the strains of the Finnish national anthem.

Sladen Will Quit Governor's Staff

OTTAWA, Oct. 8.—One change in the staff of the Governor-General here is occasioned by the retirement of Arthur F. Sladen, C. M. G., C. V. O. He has been in the Governor-General's office since 1901, and has been Governor-General's secretary since 1909. In that capacity he has been head of the personal staff to five Governors-General—Earl Minto, Earl Grey, the Duke of Connaught, the Duke of Devonshire and Baron Byng.

TEN DROWNED AS FRENCH TUG SINKS

Craft Collided With Atlantic
Liner in Trying to Dock Big
Steamer

HAVRE, France, Oct. 9.—Ten men of the crew of the French tug Ursus were drowned when the boat sank after having been in collision with the French liner Paris at midnight. The Ursus was aiding the liner to dock on its arrival from New York. It had guided the steamship into the tidal basin and then, in attempting to dock, struck the bow of the liner. The men on the Paris missed the line and also a second one. In order to throw a third line, the tug passed across the bows of the steamer. The Paris was still under way, and struck the Ursus and cut the tug in two. The Ursus sank immediately. Five of the crew of the tugboat were saved, but no trace of the others on board were found after she went to the bottom.
