### Mrs. J. S. Estey Enters Upon Duties As Mothers' Helper

Mrs. J. S. Estey entered upon her duties as mothers' helper and visiting housekeeper yesterday, inaugurating a service which has been acknowledged to be a very serious need in Saint John. The Saint John Red Cross Society has undertaken to carry on this service and the length of time that it will be continued will depend upon the funds available.

Mrs. I. F. Longley, president of the society, said last evening that Mrs. Estey's services, in this new line of endeavor have been secured for one month at present but that it is hoped that the work will be carried on indefinitely. At the outset Mrs. Estey is

working under the Victorian Order of Nurses, going to those homes where the nurses have found urgent need of some practical help and assistance.

The duties of the mothers' helper and visiting housekeeper are as varied as are the problems of the household. She is to give assistance in the home where the mother is laid aside by illness, to show ways and means of managing, to demonstrate the most practical and most economical methods and to do whatever the emergency of the moment demands.

While she is a practical nurse, Mrs. Estey's duties are not to include nursing care as she follows the Victorian

Order Nurses, who will have given the nursing care required. Sympathy, tact and quick perception are required in this new work, as well as administrative skill. Mrs. Estey is well qualified to fulfill the duties which she has undertaken and there will be no lack of opportunity to test her powers.

This new branch of the Saint John Red Cross work is to be reported upon at the regular meeting on Wednesday afternoon of next week in the new rooms of the society, 23 King street. Every member of the society and every subscriber to its funds is entitled to attend and it is hoped that there will be a large number present.
