

CHAMPION SENATORS ONLY HALF GAME BEHIND THE MACKMEN

LEAGUE LEADERS WERE SHOT OUT BY CLEVELAND

Weak Pitching Staff And Batting Slump Responsible

NEW YORK, June 15.—The Athletics, who have been leading the American League since early in May, now have their backs to the wall. Only half a game separated them from the champion Senators this morning. A crippled pitching staff and a batting slump caused a comfortable margin to dwindle in the last two weeks. Washington and Philadelphia moved along for a stretch at almost the same pace, then the Senators erupted. With but a game and a half dividing them Saturday, the champions yesterday beat the Browns, 9 to 8, while Cleveland was shutting out the packmen. Karry of the Indians gave the Mackmen their first cost of whitewash this season, 3 to 0. He allowed only five hits, of which three were by Lamar.

Washington won in the ninth after rallies by St. Louis tied the score at 8 all. Both Davis and Coveleskie were shelled from the slab.

A brush for sixth place in the American League between Detroit and New York, found Cobb's men victims of good pitching by Sam Jones. Five hits, bunched in the sixth, gave the Tigers all their runs, as the Yankees were sailing into Doyle for twelve hits and eight tallies.

Ruth Gets Homer.

Babe Ruth made his second homer of the season in this game.

The Robins, with Vance pitching, broke the week-old winning streak of the Reds in the National, 12 to 1. The St. Louis Cardinals kept up their fast pace by taking their third straight from the Phillies, 11 to 7, gathering 17 hits off three pitchers.

The Cubs took their third straight from the Braves, 7 to 3, while the Giants and the second-place Pirates had a holiday.

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New York State Athletic Commission Refuses License To Kearns

Along The Sport Trail

IF READERS of "The Ring" throughout America place any credence in an article from the pen of Jack Mason published in the June edition then Saint John has received a kado from a sporting standpoint. The writer in order to manufacture sufficient "dope" to give him a fair financial remuneration got out his hammer and started to knock his home town. After lauding a bout between George Field and Willie Gradwell the writer says: "In Saint John there are many sidewalk fans, but just a handful of fans who pay from a dollar to two dollars to see a fight card. Saint John has always been known as a poor sporting town, unless the price of admission is under a half dollar. The highest gate ever taken in at Saint John fight show was \$1,400. The highest gate ever taken in at Halifax was \$6,000."

That is nice propaganda to be circulating throughout the country. Instead of being a poor sporting town Saint John is conceded to be one of the best—comparatively speaking—in America. Boxing has never drawn big gates here because the majority of cards featured preliminary fighters from other centres. Fans were stung so much that they are now in a class with the gentlemen who come from Missouri. Another thing which must be taken into consideration is that times are pretty hard due to unemployment, and hundreds of fans who would patronize boxing bouts are not in a position to do so. The great trouble with Saint John is that there are too many knucklers living here. If a few more boosters would get on the job it would be better for all concerned.

TV COBB has certainly been hitting at a terrific rate this season. In five of his recent games he was up 18 times and secured 12 hits, the majority of which were for extra bases. It looks as if the veteran manager is showing the members of his team how to treat opposing pitchers.

IN A RECENT ISSUE of the Boston Post a picture of Jake Kilrain was published, showing the former ring gladiator sitting with his two grandchildren. This famous old-timer is the man who stood up to John L. Sullivan, former world's heavyweight champion, in one of the greatest battles recorded in ring annals. He is now 66 years of age and is employed as a night watchman at the Quincy, Mass., shipyards. Many of the older fans, who have closely followed the happenings in the cauliflower circles, will recall the great bout and will be interested to learn that Jake is still hale and hearty.

IF JOHNNY DUNDEE fulfills his promise he will pack away his boxing gloves in moth balls. He announced that he would quit the ring unless he decisively defeated Sid Terris. As the latter won every round in their recent encounter it seems to be Dundee's move.

ROGERS HORNSBY'S elevation to the management of the St. Louis Cardinals as successor to Branch Rickey, is creating more than ordinary interest in the National League. Hornsby is one of the greatest baseball players of all time and is popular with his team mates as well as fans in general. Rickey had some funny ideas of running a ball club and it was an open secret that he was not getting along well with the majority of his players. Hornsby has already started the team on their climb pennantward and it is expected that he will make a strong bid to get into the first division. Hornsby is said to be a quiet, easy going fellow who takes his honors modestly and as a result is well liked by the other teams in the National League. He makes the sixth big league playing manager, the others being Ty Cobb, George Sisler, Tris Speaker, Dave Bancroft and Bucky Harris.

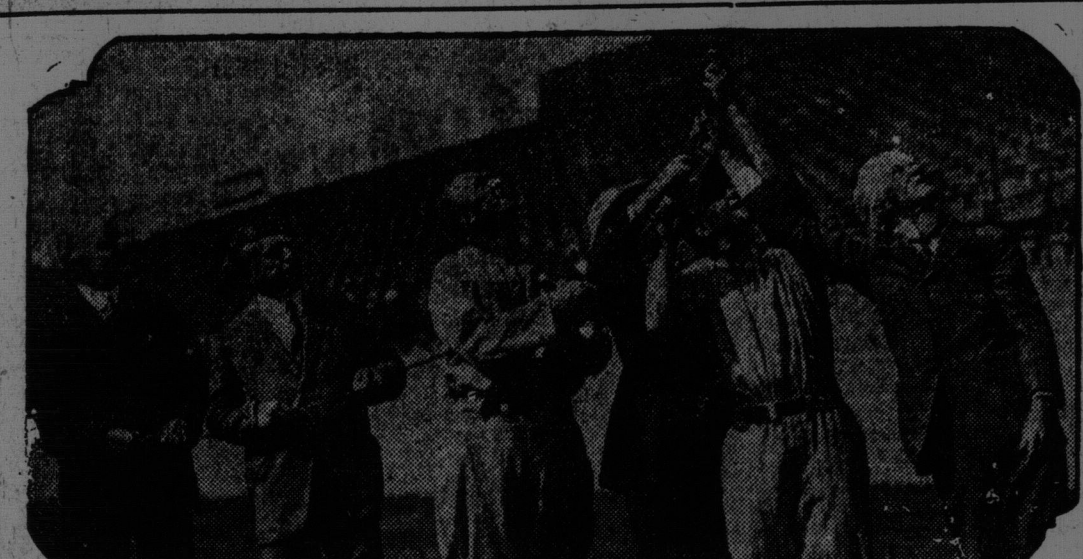
Rosa Grosse Runs 100 Yards in 11 Secs. Flat

NEW SWIM RECORD

Gertrude Ederle Better's World's Mark—Leaves For England Next Wednesday.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Miss Gertrude Ederle, who will sail for England on Wednesday to undertake the English Channel swim, Saturday shattered her own world's record for the 150-yard free style swim in a sixty-foot pool at Long Beach, New York, covering the distance in 1:41.3-5. Her former mark was 1:42.2-5.

The national record for the 220-yard breast stroke swim fell at the same meet, which was the first of the outdoor season in the metropolitan section. The new mark was established by Miss Agnes Greaghy, who posted time of 3:24 against her own former record of 3:26.2-5, set a year ago.

BOARD REFUSES TO RECOGNIZE HIM AS MANAGER

Issue Ultimatum Regarding His And Dempsey's Status

NEW YORK, June 15.—Jack Kearns is not recognized here as the manager of Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, since he does not possess a manager's license and is disqualified from obtaining one, either he or Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, recognizes the challenge of Harry Wills, negro contender for the world's heavyweight crown.

That is what the New York State Athletic Commission, through its chairman, James A. Farley, told Kearns at the regular week-end meeting of the board.

Refused a License

Incidentally, Kearns was in quest of a license as manager of Walker, that he might second the Elizabeth favorite in a bout with Harry Greb, world's middleweight champion, scheduled as one of the features of the Italian Hospital Fund fistic carnival to be held next month. Kearns got his hearing and his enlightenment, but he got no license.

Up To Dempsey

Chairman Farley advised Kearns the board could not discuss with him anything affecting or relating to Walker in so far as Empire State jurisdiction was involved, since Kearns was not licensed here or recognized as Walker's manager. Moreover, Chairman Farley told Kearns, a license in any capacity will be denied him until Dempsey returns from abroad and the manager and champion effect an arrangement whereby by Kearns and Dempsey will appear before the Commission and make known the attitude of the heavyweight champion toward the challenge of Wills. In the meantime, Kearns will be denied the privilege of occupying a place in the corner of Walker if the welterweight champion fights Greb as scheduled for the Italian Fund.
