From Montreal we hear there is a good chance of a branch being formed in Ottawa, and our President has been making an effort to start another in St. Paul, and with good prospects of success, and should both succeed as well as the "Winnipeg Infant." the "Purple Tuque" will be worn in the three most important cities of our Dominion, and one of our American cousins, and the St. George Snow Shoe Club be the largest organization of its kind in existence. But of one thing I feel sure, that come what may, the Winnipeg Branch will always lead the van.
