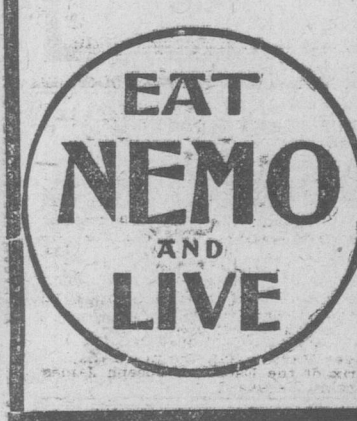

FIELD MEET IS GREAT SUCCESS

INTERESTING ATHLETIC
EVENTS AT OAK BAY

Mainland Defeats 'Island' Associ-
ation--Opening of the Cricket
Season.

Summer-like weather favored the
boys' field meet, held under the aus-
pices of the Y. M. C. A. at Oak Bay,
on Saturday. There was a good atten-
dance and the enthusiasm of the youth-
ful fraternity knew no bounds as the
different events were reeled off under
the careful guidance of A. J. Brace,
H. B. Gregory and J. W. Lormer.

The first event of the day was the
three mile Marathon race. In this
there were five entries. At the crack
of the pistol the competitors jumped
off together and for the first half lap
the five jogged along easily. Brown
and Beckwith then singled each other
out, and gradually forged ahead. Jones
soon drew out into third place from
the other two competitors, while Dixon
and Sproule a few paces from each
other, toiled on in the rear. This order
was maintained until the final bend,
the leaders overlapping Dixon and
Sproule. Coming around the last bend
into the straight for home Brown,
who had been lying behind Beckwith,
put on a terrific spurt. Beckwith tried
to respond but was unable to meet the
challenge, and Brown running strongly,
ramped home a good winner by 10
yards. B. Jones was third, a little
over a lap behind. Dixon and Sproule
also finished after an interesting race
between them for fourth place.

The performance of little Sproule in
this race called for loud cheers from
the spectators. He is quite a midget
and his fellow competitors towered
head and shoulders over him. Sproule
is a recent arrival from Winnipeg and
this was his first race meeting here.

Considering his size and years he ran
in the gamut of possible fashions and
was apparently little distressed after
the grueling performance.

Another competitor who showed great
promise on Saturday was Gordon
Agnew. He credited himself with four
wins, a second, and a third. His per-
formance in the 100 yards was a really
brilliant one, considering that he is
under 15 years of age. In his heat in
the event he won in good time of
11 seconds and it is but rarely that a
boy of his years has done the hundred
in that time.

Many of the other events were closely
contested and a good afternoon's sport

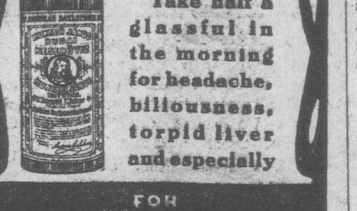

and Shanks. The loss of Adams in all
the ability turning the tide of the game
as he is undoubtedly the finest centre
forward in the province to-day.

Describing the match, the Vancou-
ver News-Advertiser says:

"Every man in the Island team was
strong. The substitutes for the ab-
sentees were good men. Hailstone, in
goal, was strong and was supported by
a magnificent pair of backs, whose cool-
ness and ease was particularly no-
ticeable. The half-backs were indeed
good. Shanks at right, was clever,
and he tackled well. Thorpe and
O'Connell were both clever and fast.
Provins, at outside left, was speedy
and dangerous, as was Glegg and Mor-
rison. McKillan was conspicuous by
his great speed, and his fine crosses to
centre.

Tones and Mitchell were the stars of
the local lads. Mitchell, outside
right, was a close second. Shailcross
was a little given to the fault of foot-
ing. He improved remarkably in the
second half, and only failed by nar-
row margins in getting a few tallies
to his credit. Forrest was the pick
of the half-back line. McKee was out
of his place as was Graham, who
they were the only positions open to
criticism. Main did not come up to
expectations owing to being out of con-
dition. Hewitt played a magnificent
game at full-back; his work, while not
so spectacular as the other backs, was
more effective. Struthers was clever
and sure and tackled well, spelling
many dangerous rushes. Hartley, in
goal had but one dangerous shot to

pass. The rest were close in shots
that got there in a skirmish.

It is no disgrace to the Islanders
that they went down to defeat; they
showed that while football has grown
in quantity and quality in Vancouver,
it has not failed to do likewise on the
Island. It was a great game and will
be long remembered by those who saw
it.
