FIRE RAGING IN OIL PLANT

FLAMES THREATEN TO DESTROY, ENTIRE WORKS

Man Blown to Pieces and Four Injured by Explosion of Powder.

Point Richmond, Cal., April 9.-Seven men are known to have been injured, four of them perhaps fatally, by a ter rific explosion at the great Standard they desire free of duty. Oil works here this morning which was followed by a fire that threatened to wipe out the entire plant.

DEFICIT SHOWN IN ESTIMATES

COUNCIL NOT LIKELY TO RAISE THE RATE

Growth of City Calls for Increase in the Expenditures.

The consideration of the civic estimates for the current year has been practically completed by the members of the council, sitting in committee, and there is a possibility that the bylaw embodying them may be ready for introduction at Tuesday evening's were spent on them last evening after the business of the streets committee was disposed of.

It is expected that there will be a deficit of between \$50,000 and \$60,000 at the end of the year. The rate of taxation is likely to remain as it was last year, but with a somewhat higher assessment the total revenue will be greater.
