I beg to state, in reference to the salmon caught, in splitting them they took a slice off each side, mak 'ing the sides the same thickness, and 'salted the slices so taken causing the 'remainder of the lish to be buried in the 'ground. In case this is not explicit 'enough, I may say that suppose the 'salmon was 25 lbs they took about half 'salmon was 25 lbs they took about half of it the choicest part and buried the rest. One of the men with me expressed himself as tollows:—'Dear Lord! but this is sinful. If we had this home we would have our winter's fish.' Both Mr. 'Whitcher and Mr. Wilmot saw this done and the rest of the men in the party will testify to the same. We were up about a fortnight and came down with five barrels of salmon without any bones, dressed as above stated. out any bones, dressed as above stated. Four of the barrels were left at Mowat's * * * We were met at Kedgwick b three fish wardens, Archbold, Polloci and Campbell, who were not for allowin the party to go up the Kedgwick, being set apart by order in Council being set apart by order in Council for breeding purposes, saying they consid-ered they were breaking their oath in allowing them to go. Mr. Mowat told them that Mr. Whitcher was there him-self and could do as he had a mind to." After much delay, we are at length inormed as to the results of the census of Canada, which was taken in April last .-The population of the Dominion is now ascertained to be 4,350,933, an increase of 865,172 over the figures of 1871. Of this aggregate, however, 317,290 is due to additions of new territory, Prince Edward Island, British Columbia and the Northwest having come into Confederation ince the last census was taken. The net increase in the four original Provinces of the Dominion is, therefore, 547,882. The following table shows at a glance the com parative population of the four old Pro

for the four original Provinces of the Dominion in ten years. The largest increase is shown by Ontario which has aed 292,609 to her population, an increas of over 15 per cent. Quebec comes next with 166,953 more than in 1871; an increase of 14 per cent. Nova Scotia has added 52,785 to her population, or over 134 per cent, while New Brunswick only shows a gain of 35,535 or 121 per cent. These figures are sufficient to show that there will be no readjustment of electoral districts in favor of increased representation for New Brunswick, and that the only province that will have increased

representation will be Ontario.

Prince Edward Island during the decade has increased from 94,021 to 107,781 or 14½ per cent while Manitoba has grown from 12,586 to 49,509. British Columbia and the Northwest are estimated at 160.
