Rewards Offered for the Capture of Japanese Ships.

A Regular Schedule Adopted by the Government of Formosa.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—A dispatch from Shanghai says the government of Formosa has published a schedule of rewards for Chinese who capture or destroy Japanese ships or capture Japanese soldiers or sailors, who may be taken dead or alive.
