



They were defeated, but on being re-inforced they bombarded the town, Oct. 21, 1870, which surrendered, and had "to pay a fine of £36,000 and to supply twenty saddle horses." At Grandpre the German commandant wis killed, and a few days later some of their wagots were attacked. The new com-mandant "thereupon ordered a farm-house near the scene of the attack to be burnt down, as it had probably berned inhabitants and several suspect-ed persons were handed over to martial law." Numerous attacks "compelled the German authorfties to act with typour against the parishes" where these attacks took place. "The meas-ures of restraint locreased in severity from money fines to imprisonment, or even the burning down of buildings and farms situated at the places of outrage." "Citizens of distinction were taken by the trains as hostages." On Oct. 25, near Launois, the francs-tirers derails at train, but were de-fered dragoons" who had fallen in the fight, "and the farm which was the scene of the outrage was burnt down.
