## THE BALLOTS AGAIN BURNED

Watchers at the Sistine Chapel-See Smoke.

ROME, Aug. 3.—Today's first ballot for pope has been taken and apparently resulted in no election. Smoke was observed issuing from the Slistine chapel chimney at 16 minutes after 11 o'clock this morning, indicating the burning of ballots.

The crowd immediately left the plazar. Many expressed regret at the fallure of the ballot. There is a popular feeling that this afternoon's ballot may elect the new pope, but this does not appear to be based on any particular reason.
