THE FISH SUPPLY.

The fish market is at present well supplied. Last week schooners from Nova Scotia brought in the first large cargoes of herring and other fish and dogs as well as heaps of refuse are in the pond and the residents state that on a warm day the stench is unbearable. Ald. McGoldrick, chairman of the board of works, was notified this morning and he has directed that the pond be cleared. It is probable that at the next meeting of the board of works orders will be issued forbidding citizens to use the pond as a dump.

NATIONAL LEAGUE.

The fish market is at present well supplied. Last week schooners from Nova Scotia brought in the first large cargoes of herring and other fish and it is expected that the supply will be good from this out. The market during the early spring was very poorly supplied owing to the backwardness of the season. The cold weather kept the fish from inland waters. The catches in the harbor have been fair during the past week or two and it is expected that herring will be very plentiful this summer. Salmon are not abundant at present They are selling at 18c. per pound and it is not likely that the price will go much lower for some time.
