A MODEL CITY.

The New York Sun points to the building of Gary, Indiana, as the most notable experiment in city building in modern times. The United Steel Corporation has decided to invest \$45,000,000 in addition to its original appropriation of \$75,000,000 in the construction of this model city on the southern shore of Lake Michigan. This city will be, according to present intention, the steel capital of the world. It is less than half an hour's journey from Chicago. The Sun gives the following brief account of what has already been done:

"One of the sites of what was little more than a year ago a waste of sand hills and dunes, and at the point where the sluggish stream called the Grand Calumet empties into the lake, the new industrial city, which has already made the desert looking lands which shade off into the prairie a scene of business activity, is rising, not slowly and as a process of growth in the usual fashion, but as rapidly as a force of 3,000 men, now being constantly added to, can build it. Originally planned to accommodate a population of 100,000, the plans have been expanded to a basis of 300,000. The tract of land in which the new industrial city is rapidly taking form is 6,000 acres in extent, with a lake frontage of more than six miles and with possibilities as to inland extension as boundless as the prairie itself.

"Perhaps the preliminary work, most of which is already done, is the most interesting, as showing the rapidity of modern processes of city construction. The sand hills and hillocks which to voyagers on Lake Michigan once formed such a picturesque sight, looking on a summer's day with the sun shining on them like cumulus clouds on the horizon, have disappeared along that part of the lake. They have been leveled and the sand has been used to fill up the shallow beach, the swamps of Grand Calumet and lower lying lands elsewhere in the tract. The new city by this process and by dredging has attained an elevation of twenty-two feet above the level of Lake Michigan, and thus the work, Chicago was compelled to do after its founding has been performed at Gary at its beginning. By dredging also a harbor has been formed, deep enough to admit the heaviest freighters of the Great Lakes bringing the iron ore from the Lake Superior region to the steel mills which are the reasons for the city's existence.

"Naturally the mills and the thousands of men who will be required to man them have the first place in the plans of the builders. Everything has been subordinated to their convenience, health and comfort, and so far the plans are strictly severe and utilitarian. But the city has also been laid out with a view to architectural effect and beauty, with parks, promenades and all the usual appearances of modern city life.

"The river has been dredged to a uniform width of 250 feet, and by steel bridges for the accommodation of the four trunk lines of railway centering here to distribute the products of the mills once these are completed and in full operation. To avoid the constant tearing up of streets for gas, water and electric mains and conduits, which is the bane of older cities, which grew and were not planned, and built, all pipes and mains in Gary are laid in the alleys, each at a certain level, thereby avoiding the confusion worse confounded in cities where pipe laying is a matter of emergency and suggests a mighty maze without a plan. In Gary everything is planned and everything bears the stamp of today. Nothing is left unprovided that experience has shown to be requisite in a model twentieth century city. It even has a Broadway three miles long, with concrete sidewalks and with two miles on each side of business blocks. The coming steel capital is not to be altogether devoted to business, but will have parks, playgrounds, theatres and opera houses. These, however, will naturally come later, though they will be planned from the start to harmonize into the general plan.

"Gary is not to be another Pullman, but a city which has had the benefit of that notable experiment and consequently an improvement upon it."

MANFIELD LEFT AN ESTATE OF \$900,000.

The Great Tragedian Was the Richest Actor in the World—He Left a Wife and One Son.

NEW LONDON, Sept. 4.—It is reported that Richard Mansfield, the great actor, left an estate of \$900,000. His will was read at his country home, Seven Oaks, here, after the funeral on Monday afternoon.

Among his possessions were: The Grange, the Homestead and Seven Oaks, worth \$150,000; the mansion, No. 215 Riverside drive, worth \$250,000; life insurance of \$250,000; scenery and costumes and dramatic effects, worth \$200,000; stocks and bonds and rights to plays, worth \$200,000.

The will, which is in charge of former Judge Dittmer, is believed to be the largest estate left by his wife and only son, Gibbs. Richard Mansfield was buried Monday in at across the street from his home, Seven Oaks, in accordance with his own request on his deathbed. The little plot is the one used by the Gardner family, from whom Mr. Mansfield purchased his summer home. The casket, including the actor's body, covered with black broadcloth, with silver trimmings, expensive, even in its simplicity, was encased in a solid steel vault and laid away in the ground within a stone's throw of the place where he died.

It is understood also that Mr. Mansfield's valuable collection of scenery and costumes will be disposed of, and every material vestige of his connection with the stage wiped out, leaving him a mere glorious memory.

MERRY DEL VAL MAY BE THE NEXT PONTIFF

Pope Pius X. is Planning a Big Shake-up in the Papal Cabinet—A New Post for Del Val.

ROME, Sept. 3.—Pope Pius X., in conjunction with the College of Cardinals, is planning the biggest shake-up that has taken place in a papal cabinet for centuries, except on the accession of a new pope. The principal one to be affected by the proposed changes is the papal secretary of state, Cardinal Merry del Val, who will be transferred to the office of papal vicar-general. Cardinal Respighi, the present vicar-general, will succeed the late Cardinal Sampaio as Archbishop of Bologna.

No official reason is given for the proposed shake-up but from those high in ecclesiastical circles it is learned that the entire movement centers about Cardinal Merry del Val. His present office is the highest in the pontifical court.

An unwritten law in church proceedings is that with a new pope there shall be an administration entirely new. For this reason it has been the custom to select for a new pope one who has not been closely affiliated with the last reigning pontiff.

Cardinal del Val is universally considered one of the ablest men in the Catholic hierarchy. That he aptly to become head of the church some day his most intimate friends admit.

Church dignitaries here interpret the intended change as an acquiescence on the part of Pope Pius X. to the ambition of his secretary of state. The secretary's aspirations, it is said, will be given a tremendous impetus by his transfer to an office, which, though one of the most important in administration, is not so closely identified with administrative business as his present one.

Twenty years ago or thereabouts, when he was a slender, swarthy youth, chiefly noticeable for a pair of wonderful brown eyes, he attracted the attention of the Vatican palace known as the Borgias apartments. Secretaries and messengers came and go. The tapestry hung rooms are noisy with the clatter of typewriters. A desk is littered with many letters and they are addressed, one and all, to

His Eminence, Cardinal Merry del Val, Secretary of State. His Holiness, Pope Pius X.

Rafael Merry del Val is one of the most remarkable figures in the Roman Catholic church today. He is the right hand of Pope Pius X. It is he who stands at the helm of the papal ship of state and guides its course through troubled waters. He directs the policy of the Vatican and has handled millions of the most loyal subjects on earth. And all this at the age of scarcely two-score and two.

HAS DOMINION OF CANADA GOT A LIVE VOLCANO?

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.—The greatest interest has been aroused in geological circles by the statement of hunters, who returned home from the Far North a short time ago, to the effect that while descending a branch of the Mackenzie river, on the Arctic slope, they discovered a big volcano, in a most lively state of activity. According to the information received by Mr. A. P. Low, the deputy-minister of mines, and director of the geological survey, the volcano is of a great height. From its crater it vomits huge flames into the sky, together with dense clouds of black smoke. At night the effect is said by the hunters to be awe-inspiring in the extreme, and the lurid flames reflected on the great rolling clouds of smoke can be seen from vast distances, the whole sky seemed to be on fire. The roving bands of Indians who formerly visited the district say it is only recently that flames and smoke have appeared. They believe that it portends some dire calamity, and they refuse to go anywhere near the locality.

Mr. Lowe has despatched Mr. Keole of his department to locate the alleged volcano, and incidentally to collect geological information regarding that little known territory. Mr. Keole will ascend the Felly river this fall, and winter at its head waters. In the spring he will cross the divide and descend the branch of the Mackenzie on the Arctic slope, where the hunters say the volcano is to be found.
