### OPERATIONS OF MR. WYNHAM'S IRISH LAND ACT

The Departmental Committee Has Issued  
Its Report.

LONDON, April 27.—In view of the comparative stagnation in purchases under Mr. Wynham's Irish Land Act, owing to difficulties in connection with the provision of funds, a Departmental Committee was appointed in November, Mr. Wynham, M. P., financial secretary to the treasury, chairman, to inquire how far the difficulties can be diminished or removed without imposing additional charges on the exchequer. This committee has now issued its report. It was estimated when the Land Bill was before Parliament in 1901 that the whole of the purchases would be covered by a capital sum of £50,000,000, and provision was made by which a bonus of £60,000,000 was to be contributed out of the Imperial Exchequer to bridge the gap between what the tenant could afford to pay and what the landlord was willing to accept. Considerable financial difficulty has, however, been created in the carrying through of transactions by reason of the unfavorable condition of the money market, which has resulted in only £10,450,000 in cash being obtained by the issue of £12,750,000 of stock, leaving an "excess" of £14,150,000, which necessitates an annual charge for £31.2 years, of £461,000. In the opinion of Mr. Wynham's Committee, the amount that will be required to finance the Land Act to completion will be not £40,000,000 but £80,000,000 more. Pending purchase agreements represent about £80,000,000, and when these have been concluded over £50,000,000 out of the £80,000,000 bonus will have been paid, leaving only £25,000,000 for future agreements estimated to aggregate little short of £60,000,000. This means that the bonus, if spread equally over all, will be hardly 5 per cent. under the Act. The Committee think, will further hamper this administration of the Act in the future, and they suggest that the limit of £80,000,000 of cash for bonus might be extended if necessary. The committee recommend that notice should be given of a date after which no agreements can be accepted or entered into under the terms of the Land Act, and that fresh legislation be passed for agreements subsequent to that date.

### MANUEL WILL PAY FOR MISSING GEMS

Father Sold Crown Jewels to Avoid a Scandal—Bank Governor Admits It.

LISBON, April 27.—King Manuel has announced his intention of personally refunding the value of the missing Crown jewels to the Royal treasury. His attitude has caused universal admiration. When King Manuel was disposed as ruler of Portugal in 1834, the Crown jewels, valued at \$2,000,000, were confiscated and deposited in the Bank of Portugal as the property of the State. Evidently the Republican press has charged that absolute proof existed of the fact that a large portion of these jewels had been sold without the consent of Parliament to meet the expenses of the Royal household. King Manuel thereupon ordered that an inventory be taken and this proved that jewels to the value of \$750,000 were missing. The governor of the Bank of Portugal was questioned and admitted the removal of the precious stones, but declared that the sale had been made upon the urgent demand of King Carlos who desired to meet current pressing debts of the Royal household in order to avoid a scandal.

### C. P. R. MECHANICAL EMPLOYEES WILL APPLY FOR CONCILIATION

WINNIPEG, April 27.—The mechanical employees of the C. P. R. decided to apply for conciliation and investigation under the Lemieux Act in their dispute with the company over the new rules and as representatives of other unions are in Winnipeg the conciliation will effect all the mechanical employees of the company west of Port William. The men named James Somerville, vice president of the machinists, Toronto, as arbitrator.

### RAN THE RAPIDS TO THEIR DEATH

Two Foolhardy Canoeists Drown at Milo Junction—One Reaches Shore Alive.

MIL0, April 27.—The determination of a man Schumacher, aged 22, to run the rapids of the Pisicatu river near the Bangor & Arctostook bridge at Milo Junction in a canoe resulted in the death by drowning of himself and Horace Stewart, aged 21, and the narrow escape of a young companion, named Davis, who managed to swim to one of the shores. A week ago Schumacher tried the feat alone and was capsize by one of the many submerged rocks but was rescued by friends on shore. Undaunted by that experience and expressing his intention to succeed at the next attempt, he put off with his two companions and headed for the rapids. They had progressed but a short distance into the treacherous waters when the canoe overturned and all were upset into the turbulent waters. Not so fortunate as on the previous experience Schumacher succumbed after being battered about and was drowned as was Stewart. Their bodies were not recovered. Davis fought his way to shore. None of the young men were married.

### SUSPECTED ANARCHIST ARRESTED IN COLORADO

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 27.—Steve Toth, said to be an anarchist and suspected of complicity in a plot to assassinate Emperor Francis Joseph, was arrested today at Okolade and taken to Denver to await extradition papers. He had been followed from Austria by an agent of the Austrian Government, who caused his arrest. Toth admitted he was wanted in Austria but denied that he was ever concerned in a plot to assassinate the emperor.
