HEARING ON MARRIAGE REFERENCE

Argument Before Supreme Court Continued Yesterday—Counsel Indicates Statutory Rights of Quebec to Regulate Marriage.

Ottawa, May 28.—Continuing his argument for the promoters of the Lancaster marriage bill and the questions referred to the Supreme Court by parliament, Eugene Lafleur, K. C., this morning before the Supreme Court said that in closing he only desired to draw attention to several statutes relating to the conferring of powers to perform marriage in the province of Quebec.

Justice Idington—"Assuming that this act or bill is passed, how can it operate in defiance of any local law of succession or unity of property? This is the serious point. Is parliament competent to declare on that?"

Mr. Lafleur—"In giving the Donatary parliament the right to legislate on divorce the B. N. A. Act gave it this authority. There is no doubt of it having the authority to pass this bill, the only thing excluded being the solemnization of marriages, whatever that may mean."

The Chief Justice—"Would that not upset the civil laws of Quebec? There would be nothing left of the civil code. What about community of property?"

Mr. Lafleur—"I admit that there would be considerable expunged from the Quebec code as a result of this bill, but it would merely define the status resulting from marriage."

Justice Duff—"The point is a very vital one."

P. B. Mignault, K. C., Montreal for the opposers of the bill followed Mr. Lafleur. At the outset he stated that there was no doubt about the construction of the Quebec code. He conceded beyond question that the code was a declaratory law and a corollary to existing laws. "In no wise is it an ordinary statute," he stated. "It is a concise expression of an entire system comprising the whole question with certain additions occasioned from certain customs. It is a declaratory law."

Continuing Mr. Mignault contended that under section 123 of the Quebec civil code priests have a distinct authority to perform marriages. He quoted numerous authorities in support of his contention. He also contended section 43 of the code as meaning that in the case of Roman Catholics the marriage must be celebrated at the domicile which means the parish.

Mr. Mignault was arguing when the court arose.

GOOD TRAIN SERVICE UNDER SUMMER SCHEDULE

I. C. R. Change of Time Will Go Into Effect June 2nd.

The summer time table on the I. C. R. which will go into effect on June 2nd, will give practically the same service in and out of St. John as last year. Number 2 express will depart at 7:10 a. m. No. 4, the Boston train for Point du Chene will leave at 11:20 a. m., carrying through sleeper to connect with the Ocean Limited for Montreal. No. 26 express which will connect at Moncton with the Ocean Limited for Halifax will depart at 12:40. The Sussex express will leave as usual at 5:15 p. m. No. 124 express, the connection with the Maritime express for Montreal, will leave at 6:35 p. m. No. 10 express, the night train for Halifax, will depart as usual at 11:20 p. m. The suburban service is the same as last summer, No. 132 leaving at 9 a. m. for Hampton; No. 136 at 12:15; No. 138 at 6:15 p. m. and No. 156 at 11 p. m. On Saturdays the noon suburban will be held until 1:15 p. m. to accommodate the suburban residents who have the Saturday half holiday.

There will be no change in the arrivals. No. 9 express from Halifax will arrive at 8:15 a. m. to make connection with the morning train for Boston. The Sussex train will arrive as usual at 9 a. m. No. 133 express connecting with the Maritime express at Moncton will arrive at 10:40. No. 25 express, connecting at Moncton with the Ocean Limited from Halifax for Montreal will arrive at 6:20 p. m. No. 7 express, the Boston train from Point du Chene will carry the through sleeper from the Ocean Limited from Montreal, arriving here at 6:35. No. 1 express from Truro will arrive as usual at 9:30 p. m. The suburban arrivals will be No. 151 at 7:45 a. m. No. 135 at 11:15, No. 137 at 2:40 p. m. No. 155 at 8:20 p. m.

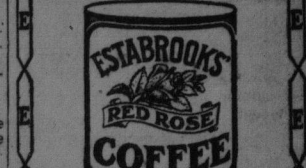
