

GLoucester County IS SOLID FOR GOVERNMENT

DECLARATION DAY PROCEEDINGS IN MANY COUNTIES IN PROVINCE

Official Figures Given Out by Returning Officers Increase Majorities of the Government Candidates. Eight Venturesome Would-be Members in Opposition Ranks Contribute Deposits to Revenues of the Province--Successful Candidates Thank Electors, but Others Generally Failed to Appear

Declaration day proceedings passed off quietly in most of the counties yesterday. The official vote shows that eight of the opposition candidates will lose their deposits.

DEMOCRATIC CHOICE MAY BE W. J. BRYAN

Lively Fight Likely at the Baltimore National Convention. Committee's Approval of Judge Parker for Chairman is Bone of Contention - Bryan will Make Serious Charge.

Baltimore, June 24.—All hope of averting a fight from the fall of the gavel in the democratic national convention vanished tonight when the national committee approved the selection of former Judge Alton B. Parker, of New York, as temporary chairman, in defiance of the threat of William Jennings Bryan to make an issue of the alleged conservatism of Judge Parker as opposed to the progressivism which the distinguished Nebraskan declares should prevail.

Mr. Bryan would not recede from the position he had taken, and tonight prepared to make his fight from the floor of the convention tomorrow to rally progressives to his standard in opposition to Judge Parker.

Mr. Bryan announced today that if no other good progressive could be prevailed upon to make the race he would enter the field himself as the opponent of Judge Parker.

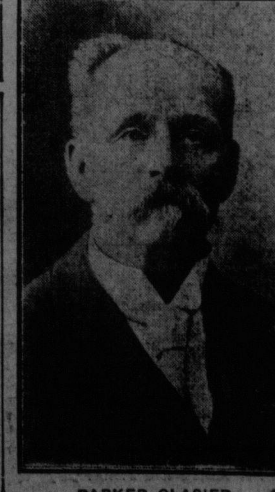
