

# Supremacy of the White Race in the Pacific the Great Problem of Coming Decade

### Imperial Power must be developed in relation to whole World Problem, and preparation made to make possible Concentration of Force at any time where Dominions have greatest menace.

London, May 1.—Plans for a defence conference of Great Britain and her dominions are rapidly assuming form, and will be complete when the consent of Canada, Australia and New Zealand have already announced their desire for such a conference and since the problem of the Pacific will be the chief topic considered by the meeting, it is believed that Canada will join the other dominions.

As the result of the trip which a Parliamentary committee made to the dominions, it was found that Australia and New Zealand statements believe firmly that the problem of the coming decade will be the maintenance of supremacy for the white race in the Pacific. It was pointed out to the committee that Japan is making preparations to develop trade and emigration towards the antipodes, and that there is a constant flow of Chinese to the islands of the Pacific. France has already largely increased her steamship facilities with these islands, and Germany, Holland and the United States also are active in the same regions.

The determination of the government to bring about the conference has been increased by reports from Sir Maurice Fitzmaurice, who has been advising the Commonwealth government on naval matters, and Sir Ian Hamilton, Inspector General of Overseas forces. It has not yet been decided whether the conference will be held in London, Canada or Australia, but the meeting is finally held, it is likely that all of the British dominions will have delegates present.

Australia and New Zealand have not taken kindly to the suggestion made by Viscount Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, in his speech in introducing the naval estimates, that the safety of those two countries was secured by the Anglo-Japanese alliance. William Ferguson, Minister of the Navy, in a speech at the House of Commons, said that the Pacific is being made safe and secure, not by the might and the majesty of the British fleet, but by the Anglo-Japanese alliance. That raises for Australia a very serious question. I hope that Australia will always be on friendly terms with Japan, and get closer to her in the relations of trade and commerce and the peaceful acts of civilization, and that the treaty will continue in its present form, for I believe it to be a "real power for peace; but when Australia is asked to rely on the Anglo-Japanese treaty for the defence of the Pacific, a very serious situation is created. Japan is a nation whose people Australia does not admit to her shores. "White Australia" ideals must be defended at all costs, as a cardinal principle of Australian political belief. Japanese civilization differs radically from that in Australia, which is compelled to see no mixing of races in her territory.

Whist is true, as Mr. Churchill said, that the naval forces should be concentrated under a unified command, the chief theatres of operations, it should not be forgotten that the Empire's naval problem is a dual one. Not only should the Imperial power be developed in relation to the world problem in order that there should be every sea where Imperial interests are threatened, but world-wide preparations must be combined to make it possible to concentrate forces at any point wherever the Dominions have the greatest menace. Australia hopes that the Imperial fleet will be so developed and organized that this country shall be in no way dependent absolutely on treaty obligations with any foreign power whatever.

The first Australian fleet unit is being completed, and it is expected that the Australian policy developing? Mr. Churchill has departed from the agreement by which the Imperial Government undertook to send to the Pacific a ship for every ship put into commission by Australia. Mr. Churchill has proclaimed that ships of similar calibre will go very well for the Pacific. Australia is entitled to something more than that statement. She entitles to free and full recognition of Imperial defense with every unit of the Empire.

Australia is building her own fleet, while New Zealand, who has her dreadnought to the mother country, has decided to start doing the same unless the Imperial Government carries out its obligation to strengthen the fleet in the Pacific.

A definition of the living minimum wage in Australia, has just been embodied in a decree delivered by Justice Heydon, president of the Industrial Arbitration Court of New South Wales, who, after an exhaustive inquiry into the cost of living in Sydney, specifies that the lowest class of unskilled labor must receive \$12.00 a week. This term is based on the existence and needs of a family of two parents and two dependent children. He found that the minimum rate for unskilled labor was \$2 a week, miscellaneous expenses including fuel, light, clothing and insurance was \$3.50, while the remainder of the \$12 was consumed in food.

In his decision the judge was guided largely by the now famous decision of Justice Higgins who in the Harvester case decided that \$10.50 weekly was a "fair and reasonable" standard to meet the normal needs of the average employee, regarded as a human being living in a civilized country.

In the Broken Hill case, decided two years later, Justice Higgins stated the following doctrine: "I cannot conceive of any such industrial dispute as this being settled effectively, which falls far short of the minimum wage which will be given to the worker, even as a man immersed will never rest until he gets his head above water. If a

man cannot maintain his enterprise without cutting down the wages which are proper to be paid to his employees—proper to be paid to his employees at all events, it would be better that he should abandon the enterprise.

The valuable watch which was stolen from Lord Londale at a race meeting some time ago, has been returned and with an apology from the thief for the failure to recognize him as a member of the brotherhood of sportsmen, who, according to the newspaper man, is immune from molestation. The newspaper man told him of the loss of his glasses, and the pugilist remarked that the pickpocket had been recognized him as a sport. That night the glasses were left at the writer's office wrapped in paper on which was scrawled: "Please excuse mistakes."

# LIFE THREATENED BY KIDNEY DISEASE Austria Puts Stop To Emigration of Men Under 34 Years

### His Health in a Terrible State Until He Took "Fruit-a-tives"

Mijenna, May 1.—By a simple ministerial decree, without the passage of any law, or even reference to parliament, the Austrian cabinet has stopped the emigration of youths and men under the age of thirty-four. They will not be permitted to cross the frontier unless they can produce a passport, and the local authorities have received strict instructions to issue such papers only to applicants who can prove that they have performed their military service, including the full term in the reserve, and have been passed into the "Landsturm," the last line of reserves for home defence. This really means twelve years of service for the average man.

The decree promises to be even more sweeping in its effects than would at first sight appear. It applies not only to bona-fide emigrants leaving their native land for the United States or Canada, possibly intending to remain away for many years, but it will also prevent many thousands of farm workers from going to Germany for field work and harvest, as has been the custom every summer. And further, since the decree makes no mention of any exceptions it is supposed that waiters (tailors, mechanics and other workers, who want to go abroad to complete their trade education, will no longer be able to do so. For at the age of thirty-four a man has usually contracted family and business ties which effectively prevent him from leaving his native land.

The new regulation apparently has been made because the military authorities recently discovered, when the recruiting levies were called up, that more and more of the young men from the rolls had gone to foreign parts. It was this which first led to the investigation of the steamship companies emigration activities.

Whist this sudden and drastic restriction of emigration will effect to some extent the whole monarchy, and in some provinces will feel it more acutely.

### FRATERNALISM, SUBJECT OF SERMON AT K. OF P. SERVICE

### An interesting discourse delivered before the Members of Carleton County Lodge Knights of Pythias

Harland, N. B., May 1.—The service in the United Baptist church Sunday evening under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias will long be remembered by the large audience present to hear the pastor, Rev. S. W. Schuman, deliver his address on Fraternity. In opening the speaker remarked that while he was laboring under difficulties on account of a severe cold, the subject was dear to his heart that he felt quite at home in dealing with it. He went into the matter quite deeply, and at times grew eloquent when the most salient points of his discourse were under treatment. It was generally conceded by those who heard him that Mr. Schuman had made the best efforts of his pastorate here.

The speaker took for his text Philimon 8, 9 and 18. These verses were part of a letter written by Paul to Philemon while the former was a prisoner at Rome. This personal letter was intended to bring about a reconciliation between a master and his slave on the basis of brotherly love and mutual friendship—the foundation stone on which Pythianism is built. He did not commend the order by certain seen facts, but even in things which need not be named. What would commend the order to its fellow man and the world would be a right, noble and acceptable spirit, the true spirit of Fraternity.

First, he would have them consider the great and growing prevalence of this spirit in the hearts of men. The speaker divided into five sections: (1) This is the golden age; the world is getting better; (2) the growing message of today is the brotherhood of man; (3) the growing thought of Christianity today is the Kingdom of God—churchism is passing away; (4) the great and growing movements of today have to do with the classes, but with the masses; (5) the great and growing national movements are full of this spirit.

The speaker spoke of the great work that is being done by individuals and societies whose work the church almost entirely overlooks. He gave figures to show the great work the Knights of Pythias were doing in alleviating the suffering of the widow and the orphan who had been bereft of their natural protectors and providers in the fifty years of the organization the order had paid out 40,000,000 to help those who were in need of assistance.

The second head of the speaker's address called for a consideration of what the true spirit of Fraternity really is. That spirit prompted Paul to treat Onesimus as he did—namely, in the spirit of natural human love, manifesting itself in noble friendship. When asking Philemon to be reconciled to Onesimus Paul states that if there is any doubt between the master and servant to lay that to his (Paul's) account—willing to bear the cost of cementing the fellowship of the two. This spirit is one that underlies the second greatest commandment—love thy neighbor as thyself. It is the spirit that wrenched black humanity from the Southern States from human ity's blacker hand. It is the spirit that moved in the heart of Pythias when he pleaded for the Senator of Syracuse that he might be permitted to go and see his wife and child before his execution at the hands of
