Notice is hereby given that it is the intention of the Common Council of the City of Saint John, not less than one month from the present date, to make application to the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick in Council, for authority to prepare a town planning scheme in accordance with provisions of an act passed by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, "An Act relating to 'Town Planning'" chapter 19, 2 George V. (1912).

The area proposed to be included in the scheme comprises all the land within the boundaries of the City of Saint John, which is unincorporated or only partially developed, also portions of the Parishes of Simonds and Lancaster, in the County of Saint John, within a radius varying from three to five miles approximately from the centre of the City, which area has been delineated, and is shown upon a map marked and known as Map No. 1, prepared in accordance with the town planning regulations prescribed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, which said map has been deposited at the office of the Common Clerk, and may here be inspected by any person interested without payment of any fee, between the hours of ten and twelve in the forenoon of any week day, and two and five in the afternoon of any week day, except Saturday, during one calendar month, next following the first publication hereof, and provision has been made for affording any person interested, any necessary explanation with reference to the said map.

Objections or representations with reference to the proposed area should be stated in writing, and be addressed to the undersigned, at his office City Hall, Saint John, N. B.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole need of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, provided the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency for the District, and by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not sub-agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homesteaded land, at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of available Dominion land, at \$20.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning his patent also 30 acres, extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Livestock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Low mining rights may be located for twenty-one years, renewable an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be located by one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton superfluous to the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands for the District, in all cases be made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of quartz, may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 100 feet. At least 500 feet must be expended in development work each year.

BREEDING—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 30 years. Rental \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25¢ per cord after the output exceeds 50,000 cords.
