Negro Profesors Will Teach Native Races a Better Civilization IN ONE LANGUAGE

English to be Only a "Subject"-Bush Schools Will be Ended on Gold Coast

January 1 next will be a red letter day in the history of the Gold Coast.

On that day the doors of a college set in an estate of four square miles on a hill overlooking the West African city of Accra will be thrown open to native students.

It will be the beginning of the realization of an ardent negro dream-a university where the black man will teach his own culture to his own peo-

The name of Achimota—the hill where the college is being built-already echoes like a magic sound wherever educated Africans gather.

Achimota is to be the mainspring of a peaceful revolution, not just a university, but the keystone of a farseeing government scheme of education which includes colleges, secondary schools, elementary schools and kindergartens throughout the length and breadth of the colony.
